Space Voices Are Reported

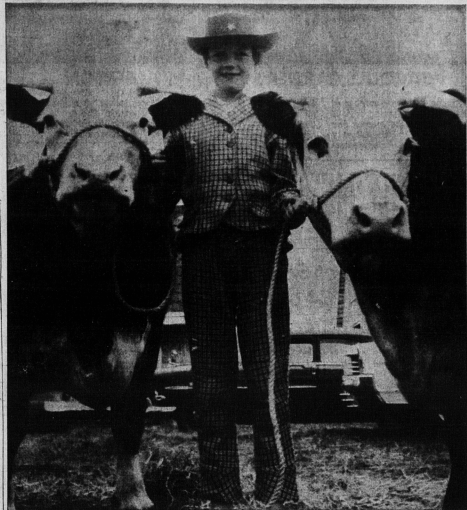
STOCKHOLM, Sweden (Reuters) — Finnish radio stations Wednesday night picked up signals on a frequency usually reserved for cosmic noise.

Battle Flares In S. Viet Nam

SAIGON, Aug. 13 (AP) — One thousand Vietnamese soldiers, ferried from Saigon in an armada of 96 helicopters, Wednesday landed an estimated 2,000 to 3,000 Viet Cong guerrillas massed in a jungle area near here.

Every available helicopter in lower South Viet Nam was called on for one of the largest helicopter assaults of the war.

A battle of several days was expected to ensue.
