### CAN MAKE BANK DEPOSITS AT NIGHT

Two employees of the Summerside branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Betty Simpson, left and Jessie MacFarlane demonstrate what is believed to be the first bank depository on P.E.I. for day and night banking.

Built into the wall in the front of the bank facing Water Street, the depository contains two channels leading to separate safes within the bank. The upper channel marked "envelopes" is used for the purpose of depositing checks and up to \$100.00 in cash.

The deposit is simply enclosed in a special envelope provided by the bank, and is dropped by the depositor in the upper slot outside the building.

Demonstrating the other feature of the depository, Miss Simpson (left) is seen placing one of the special "wallets" in the wallet depository, which is being opened by Miss MacFarlane. Special keys enabling them to open this depository slot are provided to customers using this service.

The wallet depository enables merchants, business men and others to give banking protection to cash deposits at any hour. The day's deposit, including cash and checks can be made up in the usual manner and disposed of by placing it in the depository which leads by a protected channel slot into a large safe.

The depositor has the option of permitting the bank to open the wallet, check the deposit and place the proceeds to his credit, or he may leave the wallet in the depository for safe-keeping and pick it up still locked, next banking day.

The installation of this new service is part of an expansion and modernization program presently being completed at the Summerside bank where the manager is Mr. S. D. Reid.

#### N. Y. Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—Late selling in the stock market Thursday nipped a recovery movement that was well into its second session.

Aircrafts and railroads were strong points in the market. Rails held well to the close, but aircrafts ended mixed.

Sellin, when it came, seemed to centre in oils and chemicals to a large extent, although most major divisions were lower. Prices were down 1 to around 3 points while gains of 1 to 2 points were found.

After the market closed, the federal reserve board in Washington raised the discount rate in Minneapolis and San Francisco to 3 per cent and in nine others to 2 1/2 per cent from the present level of 2 per cent. In an absence of a meeting of the governors in Chicago, the rate remained unchanged to 2 1/2.

The discount rate is the amount charged commercial banks for money borrowed from the central banks.

The associated Press average of 60 stocks was off 20 cents at \$188.80. The industrial component of the average dropped \$1.80 but railroads managed to advance 70 cents while utilities remained unchanged.

Volume mounted to 2,700,000. Hupp Corp. was the day's most active issue up 1/4 at 57 on 137,900 shares.

Canadian issues were mixed on the New York exchange. Granby Mining and Walker - Gooberham both added 1/4 and Dome Mines was up 1/2. International Nickel fell 1/4. Distillers Seagram lost 1/4. Canadian Pacific dropped 1/4. Hudson Bay Mining was off 1/4 and Aluminum Ltd. skidded 1/4.

On the American exchange Canadian issues were mixed. Sapphire Petroleum and Scurry - Rainbow Oil both gained 1/4 and Brazilian Tractor added 1/4. Preston East Dome and Jupiter Oils both slipped 1-16. Canadian Marconi fell 1/4 and Eureka lost 1-16.

OTTAWA (CP) — Any immediate upward adjustment of the \$40-a-month old age security payment for Canadians 70 and over should come from the provinces in the form of supplementary allowances, Health Minister Martin said Thursday.

He also urged that there be no means test on \$40-a-month old age assistance pensions paid jointly by the federal and provincial governments to persons between 65 and 70.
