About 250 prospects have been lined up for membership and 18 teams, each made up of two board members, will call on these prospects during the day-long campaign.

The campaign will be kicked off with a "blitz" breakfast at the Charlottetown Hotel on Tuesday morning. At 8 a.m. Dr. Frank MacKinnon will be the keynote speaker.

The membership campaign will be the highlight of Board of Trade Week in Charlottetown which runs from April 23 to April 28. Main project of the week is the drive for new members which it is hoped will double the ranks of the board.

LITERATURE MAILED

Members of the canvassing teams have agreed to devote the entire day to make sales presentations to prospects on joining the board. This weekend, literature on board activities is to be mailed out to prospects.

In May, the Charlottetown board will be celebrating its 75th anniversary and it is interesting to note that the grandfather of the present board president, G. K. G. Peake, was the seconder of a motion at a meeting of merchants 75 years ago that a board be formed.

Election Gear Is Rolling As Gaudet Gets Word

A. Walthen Gaudet, Charlottetown, chief returning officer for Queens County, announced last night that he received the expected telegram from Ottawa, announcing the dissolution of Parliament and calling for a federal election Monday, June 18, yesterday morning.

The wire also informed him that the writ of election had been issued on April 19 and that the nomination day will be June 4. With balloting to take place on June 18, declaration day for the Queens constituency has been set for June 25.

The advanced polls will be held Saturday June 9 and Monday June 11. Mr. Gaudet said that the proclamation announcing the election and the details of its conduct is now in the hands of the printer.

Now that he has received official word, Mr. Gaudet said that all the election machinery will get into full swing within a few days. All the work in connection with the enumeration will be completed next week, and on Monday, April 30 an army of enumerators will swarm throughout the county.

Mr. Gaudet's first task, and that of his counterparts, Daniel MacLean, DeGros Marsh, for Kings County, and Frank Bryant, Alberton, for Prince County, is the preparation of the official proclamation. This impressive document sets forth the times, dates, and places for nominations to be received; date of the election and polling hours, and similar pertinent information.

Following this will come the naming of enumerators, whose job will be to list all the eligible voters. There will be two of them for each city poll and one for each rural poll. Since enumeration is scheduled to start April 30, and completed within a week, this phase will be underway early next week, with the enumerators selected, sworn, and given instructions in their duties.
