The picturesque little Springs Park is turned into a sea of Fairyland with 6,000 lighted tapers, most of them placed on trees along the stream which runs through the park, making a holiday picture beautiful to behold.

Instead of shooting off firecrackers and losing eyes and fingers, the boys of Litzitz have the job of placing the candles on the trees, rocks, and floats along the stream. The girls parade and perform lovely folk dances. Result: a gala day for everybody with no tragedies to mar the happy event.

Ever hear of the Lord's Prayer Rock? No? Well, you'll find it in Bristol, Vermont. And the strange story behind it is that a certain M. D. of the little berg couldn't

bear to hear the farmers cursing and swearing as they drove their sheep and cattle past the rock to market. So the good doctor conceived the idea of having the Lord's Prayer carved on the rock, hoping the farmers would read it and stop their loud swearing!

Local Baha'i's And Anniversary

The local Baha'i community will celebrate the anniversary of the birthday of the founder of their faith, Baha'u'llah, with a public meeting to be held in The Charlottetown Hotel at 8 o'clock on November 12th. Mr. Robert Donnelly of Charlottetown will be the speaker.

Mr. Donnelly, the chairman of the Local Baha'i Group, in announcing the meeting, stated that this is the opening event of a year-long celebration of the Baha'i Centenary which commenced on October 16, 1952.

"The Baha'i World Faith," said Mr. Donnelly, "embraces people of at least 30 different races, including Eskimos in Alaska, Maoris in New Zealand and Sudanese in Africa. They believe their Revelation is the fulfillment of ancient and modern religious prophecy, namely that he is the 'Promised One', the 'Spirit of Truth', and the 'Comforter' referred to in the Bible and other Holy Books."

The Centenary observance will reach its climax in North America on May 2, 1952 with the Public Jubilee Dedication of the Baha'i Temple at Wilmette, Ill. The designer of this magnificent House of Worship was the Canadian architect, Louis Bourgeois.

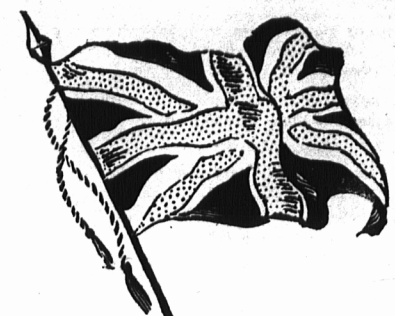
It was decided to hold the annual turkey dinner the last Wednesday in January, and discussion was held as to the menu, etc.
