Huge Contract For Boilers Is Granted Firm In Quebec

QUEBEC (CP)—The Quebec government will officially announce Monday that a \$75,000,000 contract for the production of boiler equipment for Australia has been granted to a firm in Sherbrooke, Que., a reliable source said here.

The announcement will involve the production of turbine boilers, to be used in Australian hydro-electric generators. The firm involved is Superior Combustion Engineering.

Maurice Bellemare, Quebec's industry and commerce minister, will make the announcement, said the source.

The source added that the minister also will announce that new industries involving investment of \$250,000,000 in Quebec were obtained during the months of October and November.

The new industries, of a variety of types, will be located in seven different regions of the province.

Negotiation of the boiler contract began six months ago, another source said, and Superior Combustion Engineering began expanding its plant facilities in preparation.

This source said the company had constructed an addition to its plant measuring some 400 by 150 feet.

A spokesman for the municipality of Sherbrooke, a nearby industrial producing city in the Eastern Townships of Quebec, said some 200 new jobs would be created by this contract.

The source said the city had been involved to some extent in the obtaining of the contract.

Although the municipal tax holiday is being given to Superior, the municipality made a bid for the plant available at "modest prices."

Sherbrooke, he said, has always had "a father and son relationship with new industries."

Company officials were not available for comment and it was not known when production would begin.

Student Pleads With Young Not To Use Drug Marijuana

VANCOUVER (CP)—A 20-year-old student, ordered by the court to write a 5,000-word essay on his experiences with marijuana, pleads with young people not to use the narcotic.

Richard McKinnon of Toronto said he started on the marijuana kick after reading that the drug was not a heinous destroyer of a healthy mind.

This aroused his curiosity. Now he had learned his lesson.

Magistrate Les Bewley ordered the essay Nov. 29 as a condition of a two-year suspended sentence after McKinnon pleaded guilty to trafficking in marijuana.

The magistrate said at the

time he hoped the exercise would deter other young persons from experimenting with the drug.

McKinnon said in his essay he became aware of marijuana a year ago.

"I was astounded to see before me in print, denials of the drug's addictive nature. In fact, as I read further, I felt the drug, if what was written was true, had suffered a great injustice to its name."

"I was led to believe that taken in lesser quantities, it was a superlative sedative, taken in greater quantities, a mildly psychedelic influence."

The Toronto student told of meeting a heroin addict and trafficker whose girl friend resorted to prostitution to pay for their habits.

"He was saying that I would learn," McKinnon wrote. "I'd bloody well learn to be like him, as if it was a great privilege to be a depraved junkie."

Pharmaceutical Association Calls Inquiry Claim False

TORONTO (CP)—The Canadian Pharmaceutical Association has termed as "an absolute falsehood" a claim before the Commons Drug Prices Inquiry in Ottawa Thursday by the Canadian Cystic Fibrosis Foundation that drug costs for sufferers ranged up to \$300 a month.

Mr. Turnbull cited a survey in Saskatchewan in 1964, when the provincial pharmaceutical association tried to determine the size of the problem. Only two or three of Saskatchewan's known 35 cystic fibrosis families answered.

Nonetheless, the province's pharmacists "continued to seek ways and means of reducing the financial burden on these families" and, in late 1965, a special price system was arranged, he said.

"In other provinces, similar solutions are being researched at considerable expense of both time and money to pharmacists' organizations."

"Saskatchewan is possibly the best example of special arrangements made by pharmacists through government agencies to meet special circumstances."

"If the cost of modern drug therapy is higher than some expect to pay, or higher than society feels some patients should be expected to pay on their own behalf, it is not because pharmacists and their associations... aren't doing everything possible to keep them down."

"Pharmacists are once again the whipping boys" and described the foundation statements as "not based on fact."

The few hundred cystic fibrosis sufferers in Canada require medication ranging from a few dollars to possibly \$300 a month—a financial situation which is also faced by sufferers of some other diseases—averaging about \$450 a year.

"It is an absolute falsehood to claim that drugists' associations have not offered to help and have not responded to appeals."

"Just how far can retail pharmacists go in assisting each and every group which feels that it has a special case to present? How far have practitioners of other professions gone? How concerned are the individuals themselves?"
