Impressive indeed was the Remembrance Day service at the Memorial Square in Summerside yesterday. It was possibly one of the most largely attended memorial services ever held in Summerside. A record number of people turned out to take part in the ceremonies to honor the dead of two world wars. Although the weather was most unfavorable, the planned routine was carried out in the manner in which all proceedings were arranged reflects much credit on those concerned.

As the chimes of Trinity Church rang out, the parade formed up on Fray Street headed by the Canadian Legion Band, with the scarlet tunics of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police immediately following, the parade proceeded north on Spring Street to Memorial Square where the services opened with "O Canada". This was followed by the silence and reading by Eric Campbell, vice president of the Summerside branch of the Legion.

Special Armistice Day Services At O'Leary Church

The spacious O'Leary United Church was packed to the very doors last night at 7:30 p. m. when the special armistice service was conducted. It is estimated that over 450 people attended, with extra seats provided and many standing in the entrance. The service was presided over by Rev. W. G. Dickson.

A special feature of the service was the gift to the church of a large memorial Union Jack in memory of the following six boys who paid the supreme sacrifice: Private Emerson J. Campbell, Private Alfred Dennis, Trooper Wallace Dennis, Major Reginald D. McNeill, Sergeant Carfield Ramsay and Sergeant Ernest A. Trednick.

The flag was unveiled by Mrs. Nelson Dennis, mother of one of the boys who paid the supreme sacrifice. The responsive reading was read by Lloyd Matthews, president of O'Leary Legion. The guest soloist was Miss Evelyn Gay. The choir, under the leadership of Mrs. James H. MacWilliam, was heard in a special anthem.

The guest speaker was Brigadier W. W. Reid, D.S.O., E.D. of Charlottetown, who directed the Physical Fitness for the Province and one of the executives of the Boy Scouts Association. The minister remarked he had known Brig. Reid at Mount Allison 20 years ago. He has received many honors in peace and war, not the least of which was that fifteen years ago today, a winsome lady became the charming bride and they were celebrating their 15th wedding anniversary at the special service. The minister, on behalf of the congregation, wished them many more happy anniversaries.

The Brigadier was heard in a fine message on service, sacrifice and satisfaction. He spoke about the great advantage of living in Canada, and how we should endeavour to carry high the torch of those who died. He spoke about the high community spirit of O'Leary and district and urged continued co-operation of all the people in all causes of local and national importance and also in church work. The benediction and the National Anthem brought this fine service to a close.

previous statement by the President that the President and Churchill would not meet in Key West where the President expects to remain for weeks, working on his "State of the Union" budget and economic messages.

There was speculation Churchill might address a joint session of Congress. The President and Churchill got to be warm friends in the early stages of the British-Russian, French-American talks at Potsdam in 1945 before the British election of that year brought Churchill's replacement by Clement Attlee.

No details have been arranged for the visit. Churchill is said to want to emphasize that: 1. There must be a closer relationship between the United States and Great Britain, calling for frequent Truman-Churchill meetings and regular meetings between State Secretary and Foreign Minister Eden.

2. Britain will have to seek substantial financial help from the United States to solve the problem of economic shortages in that country. 3. Britain should have a much greater voice in developing foreign policy involving both governments.

On another important point, Churchill is expected to stress that some way must be found to better relations between Russia and the western democracies. Churchill has advocated a top level meeting toward that end, but Truman has consistently opposed a meeting with Stalin unless the Russian leader would come to Washington.

Royal Party Will Occupy 15 Staterooms

MONTREAL, Nov. 11 (CP) - When Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh sail for home Monday from Conception Bay, Nfld., the Royal Party will occupy 15 staterooms on the starboard "A" deck of the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Scotland.

The company announced today that redecoration and refurbishing were completed while the ship was at Quebec City where she docked on a regular run. The Princess and Duke will use three central cabins—the Princess' room, the Duke's room and, for both, a combined sitting and dining room. Princess Elizabeth's room has a fitted carpet with a turquoise pattern on a grey background. The curtains are beige and blue-striped silk. Easy chairs in the Royal suite have willow green tapestry, with cushions of silk brocade in peach bloom and gold. The furniture was chosen for the occasion.

The Duke's cabin has fitted carpet in Georgian green and grey; curtains of green and gold striped moire damask. The large easy chairs are upholstered in green-ribbed tapestry, while the cushions have brown and gold stripes. The furniture is of bluish-red chestnut. The combined sitting and dining room has a carpet with a ruby pattern on a grey background. The curtains are purple, green and cream-striped silk. Dining chairs are upholstered in purple brocade shot with gold, while the settee is in a rich wine-colored brocade. The furniture is of light Nigerian walnut.

All three rooms are painted in pastel shades.
