STREET LIGHTING.—The exhibition of street lighting by the improved incandescent gas lamp is creating much interest among the citizens, and each evening prominent members of the community may be seen on Great George street inspecting the lamps placed by the gas company. The idea of the exhibition is to demonstrate the superiority of the incandescent gas lamp over the arc lamp for street lighting with a view to its adoption by the City Council. Hundreds of these lights have been adopted at Boston, Baltimore, Brooklyn, Columbus, Cincinnati, Dayton, Ithaca, Omaha, Freehold, Worcester and many other cities. Portland, Me., is the nearest city to Charlottetown to adopt the system. They are using over three hundred lights there, and the result are satisfactory.
