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### S'side Police Check On Charge Made By 6-Year-Old

SUMMERSIDE — A man who is thought to have enticed a six-year-old Summerside girl into what is described as a blue or dark-colored half-ton truck while the child was on her way home from school Friday afternoon, is still being sought by police.

This little girl said she accepted the man's offer to drive her home when he claimed to be a friend of her parents' after stopping her to inquire about another child at the school.

Instead of taking her home it seems the man drove north on Central Street and continued some distance from Summerside through the Sherbrooke area to an unhabited area where he forcibly removed the child's clothing.

Later medical examination revealed that the little girl had not been physically injured, but the matter is regarded with extreme concern by the police.

After being driven back to Summerside in the truck the terrified youngster was released from the truck at the corner of Maple and Central Streets from where she proceeded to her home.

Police believe that a few persons may have witnessed something which may assist them in the investigation, and have requested the confidential cooperation of anyone who may have helpful information which may lead to apprehending the man.

## Former Prime Minister Of South Africa Dies

STELLENBOSCH, South Africa (Reuters)—Former prime minister Daniel Malan, a doctor of theology who became the chief architect of South Africa's racial segregation policies, died Saturday at 84.

Malan, 84 since October, suffered a stroke and died in his sleep at his home in this quiet university town 30 miles east of Cape town.

Gov. Gen. Ernest Janzen cancelled all his public appointments and Prime Minister Hendrik Verwoerd drove here to convey his personal sympathy to Malan's wife. A state funeral will be held Wednesday.

Verwoerd said of his former leader, prime minister from 1948 to 1954:

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DR. MALAN

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Malan held the premiership until October, 1954, when he resigned at the age of 80.

He then made what was considered a major political blunder—seeking to designate N. C. Havenga as his successor. Instead, the Nationalists elected Johannes Strijdom, another fiery partisan of apartheid who died last August and was succeeded by the equally fiery Verwoerd.

These acts, in a country whose non-whites outnumber whites about five to one, divided South Africa into racial zones, provided for a separate electoral role and parliamentary representation and made it compulsory for every South African to carry a certificate giving name, address and color.

In 1950, Malan initiated the suppression of Communism Act under which an original group of 156 persons of all races—white, Negro, Indian and mixed blood—later were indicted at the beginning of a still-continuing treason trial.

Daniel Francois Malan was born on May 22, 1874, in Riebeckwest, a village in Cape province. He was of Huguenot descent and the son of a farmer.

He graduated with a master of arts degree at Victoria college in Stellenbosch and as doctor of theology at Holland's Utrecht University in 1904.
