ARTIFICIAL INSEMINATION

To date, eleven hundred and fifty-two breedings have taken place for breeding over five thousand cattle in five newly organized clubs.

Inseminators have been chosen in four of the clubs, and the fifth club will choose its inseminator this week, Ted Sabine of the O'Leary and District Artificial Breeding Club.

The Eastern Kings Artificial Breeding Club Directors met in the Town Hall, Souris, last Tuesday. The President Major Reid introduced Dr. Fisher who heads the Artificial Insemination Program.

The Tye Valley and District Artificial Breeding Club Directors met in the Tye Valley hall last Wednesday. The purpose of the meeting was to elect the club officers.

Beecher Dermal Richmond R. R. was elected President and Preston Grigg Tye Valley as Secretary-Treasurer.

In the Montague and District the Directors will meet the latter part of this week to consider the applications for the position of inseminator for the club.

The Directors are as follows: Dan MacLeod Victoria Cross; William Hunter Dundas; Harold Anson Lower Montague; Don Johnston Peter's Road Glen MacLaren New Perth; Philip MacEachern Cardross; Raymond Riley Gaspareaux; George MacPherson Kilmuir; Don MacQuarrie Rosemeath.

In the clubs which have organized the service fee has been set at

four dollars in each case. This entitles the breeder to three services if necessary. If at any time a period of ninety days or more elapses between the first and second or the second and third services the next insemination will be considered as a new service and the usual service fee shall apply.

As stated before three inseminators are now under training and three more will commence training next week. If everything works according to plan all Clubs will be in operation during the month of May.

BLACKLEG Last summer a farmer reported that he lost five out of eleven heifers on pasture. A post-mortem examination was conducted and it was established that all five animals had died from a disease known as Blackleg.

This big loss could have been prevented if the heifers had been inoculated against the disease. It could have been prevented by an investment of less than two dollars.

Each year losses are reported from various parts of the Province. All calves and young stock should be protected. It is only necessary to have them inoculated once. If this work is done on a district basis
