Extradition Extension. WASHINGTON, Dec. 20. Among the memorials presented to the Senate to-day was one from the American Surety Company, of New York, praying for the extension of the extradition law to cases of embezzlement, etc.

A Dangerous Obstruction.

NEW YORK, Dec. 20. The breaking adrift of the great raft of timber, from Nova Scotia, has caused consternation among mariners. The raft is now a dangerous obstruction in the track of vessels approaching New York or Philadelphia.

Salvationists on Trial.

QUEBEC, Dec. 20. In the case against the Salvation Army, the police judge yesterday decided there was sufficient evidence to put the accused Salvationists upon their trial for the offence of creating a public nuisance by their parades.

Disaster at Sea.

NEW YORK, Dec. 20. The steamer Portia arrived to-day from Souris, P. E. I. She had in tow the brig Endric, Capt. Mahony, which left St. John seven days ago with building materials.

Preparing for War.

PESTH, Dec. 20. Defensive operations are progressing in all parts of the country. Telegraph offices have been ordered not to transmit reports. A number of regiments are ready to proceed to Galacia should Russia reinforce her troops on the frontier.

The Great Raft Abandoned.

NEW YORK, Dec. 20. The great raft launched on the 15th ult. at the Finger Board, near Two Rivers, Nova Scotia, and which the steamer Miranda was towing to this port, was abandoned at sea off Block Island on Sunday, during a fearful snow storm.

Officially Contradicted.

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 20. The report that another attempt was made to assassinate the Czar is officially contradicted.
