Local and Other Items.

The ice at the Rink is in splendid condition. St. Patrick's Brass Band will attend to-night.

MR. CHAS. BELFORD, late editor in chief of the Mail, is very low, and is not expected to recover.

By cablegram to Peake Bros. & Co.—Steamship "Prince Edward" sailed from Liverpool for New Orleans, on the 10th inst.

St. James' Church.—The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper will be dispensed to-morrow, at the forenoon service. Seats supplied for strangers.

It is said that over thirty children have died in the village of Montebello, County of Ottawa, from Diphtheria this winter. The disease is also prevalent in other villages in Ottawa County.

The "Northern Light" was detained in Georgetown yesterday by the storm. She crossed to Picton this morning and left at 1.40 p. m., on return with mails and passengers.

The hearing of appeals from the recent city assessment ended yesterday evening. Out of the four hundred and five appeals heard two hundred and thirty-six were confirmed and reduced. A large number were dismissed on account of the appellants being late in making their appeals. These were, however, heard, and will, we understand, be brought before the City Council, to be disposed of by that body.

A DISPATCH from Winnipeg says: "Louis Riel is reported to be in Pembina, where he has been about a week, though his presence there is known to a very few. It is stated that he has been in a college in the Province of Quebec, and not in an asylum. He is evidently in good health. His intentions have not yet been ascertained, but it is rumored that he visited this side of the boundary."

ABOUT three weeks ago a French girl, from Lancaster village, Ontario, came home sick from Montreal and died in two days. It was afterwards learned that nearly all of the families that attended the wake are down with the small-pox, so the doctors conclude it was malignant small-pox that she died of. It is now in 8 families, with 23 cases and 6 deaths. It is confined to the poor outlying section of the village, and most active and stringent means have been taken to confine it to its present limits.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

OTTAWA, Jan. 10.

The Government offices are daily crowded by manufacturers and merchants, who are desirous of assisting in framing the National Policy.

It is said the Government intend shortly to commence active operations on the Pacific Coast, so far as the construction of the Pacific Railway is concerned, and that work will be divided into two sections. The presence of many contractors in the city is accounted for in this way.

Justice Taschereau, of the Supreme Court, is expected to visit the capital next week, for the purpose of being sworn in by the new Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, whoever he may be. Should the choice fall upon a judge of the present Court, it would not be necessary to fill the Puisne Judgeship thus vacated at the present time.

LONDON, Jan. 10.

The Viceroy of India telegraphs confirming the news of General Roberts' victory over a Habis tribe, but says that owing to the rumors that attacks were to be made by Mingals, General Roberts intends to return to Koorum, concentrating his forces, which are much scattered. Friendly letters have been received from several Sindars of Cabul.

The general feeling in Cabul is very strong against the Ameer and Russia. The enemy opposing General Roberts in the fight on Tuesday numbered 6,000. The British loss was two killed and four wounded.

OTTAWA, Jan. 9.

At a caucus of the Ontario Opposition, this morning, Mr. Meredith, member for London, was elected Leader.

The suggestion has been made that a block of residences for Ministers of the Crown should be erected in Ottawa. It is suggested that this would give employment to workmen, and, at the same time, induce a large number of Cabinet Ministers to take up their residence here.

The election of Mr. McIntosh, for Mayor, will be contested on the grounds of irregularities, lack of property in qualification, bribery and corruption on the part of himself and agents.

LONDON, Jan. 9.

A Tasikind special says another letter has been received by General Kaufman from General Rasgnoff, dated Dec. 23rd. The letter announced his arrival with the Ameer at Magarisharif. It conveys the important information that Shere Ali still persists in his intention of going to St. Petersburg, where Kaufman has not, as yet been instructed. The situation is, therefore, one of extreme delicacy, as it grows hours more interesting.

A Paris despatch says that if the Bey of Tunis does not accord satisfaction by today, the French Consul is instructed to withdraw and six ironclads with transports will immediately leave Toulon for Tunis. All the powers approve of the attitude of France, though Italy is more reserved than others.
