SUPREME COURT. WEDNESDAY, Nov. 20. Emma Jane Crabbe vs. George Carson.—T. J. Trinity Term, 1895. Verdict for plaintiff. Chief Justice delivers written judgment discharging rule for new trial with Mr. Justice Fitzgerald concurring. Mr. Justice Hodgson in written judgment dissenting. A. A. McLean, Q. C., for plaintiff. W. S. Stewart, Q. C., for defendant. On motion of A. A. McLean, Q. C., the court appoints Wm. McPherson of Calcutta, a commissioner in Queen's County to take affidavits in the Supreme Court. In re special case re Roadway to Victoria Park, Mr. Hazard, Q. C., moved that the order of 7th September, 1895, made at Chambers, granting a perpetual injunction, be set aside. Court refused motion. George Dixon vs. James Gorman.—The defendant having been arrested on judgment obtained by plaintiff, Mr. H. C. Macdonald, for plaintiff, shows cause against rule to discharge defendant. Mr. W. S.
