S'side Aces Take 4-goal Lead In Series Opener With P.W.C. Welshmen

—At the Raceway Stadium Saturday night, the Summerside Aces established a four-goal lead in the first game of a home and home total goal series with Prince of Wales College, beating the Welshmen 9-5. The series is a semi-final, the winner advancing into the finals with the St. Dunstan's squad which eliminated the Abbies in a sudden death game at the Charlottetown Forum last week. The Aces' production line Schurman - Harris - Schurman accounted for five of the nine tallies.

—Paul Schurman had a brace of tallies with one assist, and Vance Harris one goal and two assists.

—The Aces had a 3-1 lead half way through a penalty-free first period, but the Collectors fought back to a 3-1 tie before the end of the frame. The home forces outscored P.W.C. 3-1 in the snatched frame and held the same margin on goals in the final session. The third period produced two brief fistic scuffs, and majors were handed out to Pone, Whitehead, P. Schurman, and Wood.

—Referee Chalk Kennedy suffered a painful injury the result of falling on a puck near the end of the second period, but was able to return to the ice to finish his officiating chore.

O'Leary Wins Hockey Series With Alberton

—The Alberton Regals defeated the O'Leary Maroons 9-4 in a hard fought game at Alberton on Saturday night but lost the two-game total goal intermediate "B" hockey series by a slim one-goal margin, O'Leary having won the opening game by a decisive 8-2 score at Robert Profit.

—With a powerful six-goal lead, the smooth working O'Leary squad were outscored in the opening frame, the Regals chalking up three markers in the first five minutes of play with the Maroons lone tally coming at the sixteen minute mark.

—In the middle session, both teams battled furiously, many end to end rushes keeping an estimated six hundred spectators in a flurry of excitement. W. Harris fired in two markers for O'Leary, Richard setting a single for Alberton to make the count 4-3 for the Regals.

—The final period saw the Regals forge well ahead in the game chalking up five goals at the half-way mark of the period to tie up the series 11 all. G. Fraser getting a single, McCrae with three goals for the hat trick and Glen Matthews earning the tying goal at the ten-minute mark. Second later, W. Harris snapped up a loose puck in front of the Alberton net to break the tie with the last goal of the game. Play was extremely fast and hectic in the last half, neither side scoring with several timeouts for injured players to be removed from the ice and a long argument over a disputed goal. The Alberton team claimed the puck had been shot into the O'Leary net during a scramble and pileup of players in front of the cage but the goal judge decision, finally upheld by the referees, was no goal. This whimsical spoof of lobbying activities, Senate committee hearings and the social activities of VIP's gives a revealing account of what goes on behind-the-scenes in the nation's capital.

Their courtship is as unusual as it is humorous.
