

tion between them. Well, Sir, after this information, I suppose I owe him an apology, for having associated a gentleman of his size with the writer of the first article; but really the family likeness was so strong, that I was unable to discover the identity of the two. However, as far as possible, to make amends, permit me to introduce this gentleman to the especial acquaintance and notice of the public, and to prevent other persons making similar blunders to my own, allow me to mark and number him LICENSED TEACHER, No. 2, author of the two witty and logical productions published severally in Numbers 265 and 269 of the Colonial Herald, &c.; and to inform the people of this Island that this is the genuine Simon Pure—no common teacher!

This last production of his, Mr. Editor, is quite a settler,—the very ne plus ultra of all discussion on the subject in hand; and cannot fail to establish his reputation as an author beyond all comparison. The whole article, Sir, reminds me of the operations of a pig in a potato field, which, instead of proceeding regularly with the process of digging, travels so confusedly through the field, that it is impossible to trace the connection and progress of his efforts—to find the beginning, middle, or end. As examples of the peculiar cleverness of this author, just remark the pointed witicism of finding brains (!) for me, the sagacious discovery of my misuse of the word rhetoric, and the "satirical" address with which he has concluded the sage paragraph in which this important discovery is promulgated. Was there ever anything so smart and pretty before? It is quite a literary morceau, pre-eminently even in the luminous productions of A LICENSED TEACHER!

This writer wishes now to make out that the arrogant sentiments rebuked in the second paragraph of my former communication were not contained in either of the previous articles. Really, Sir, I lament that his memory is so unfaithful. He should, before committing himself in such a way, have read the articles again, as I recommended in my concluding clause, and then he would not have blundered so egregiously. As to his "wishing to contradict" these things, which he avows, I do not wonder at that, or that he should even more strongly wish that he had never given expression to such sentiments. But, Sir, it is difficult to gather spilled milk. The LICENSED TEACHER is under a mistake, in supposing the object of my last letter was "to correct" his previous effusions. I was fully aware that they were not susceptible of any improvement, and that the only method of repairing them was that which is sometimes made use of with an old garment—to mend it with a new one.

I have no reluctance to A LICENSED TEACHER "advocating his own cause," and were there any real necessity, I would not be reluctant to vindicate his fraternity from injustice. But, Sir, I must decline the honor of blowing the trumpet which this writer seems desirous of putting into my hands, to proclaim the super-excellence of their character and qualifications, and to advocate the absurd idea of allowing them a Representative in the House of Assembly, or even "to obtain them a larger sum of money from the Treasury;" neither of which, Sir, "according to my own logic," is tenable. And, to be plain, my candid opinion is, that too large a portion of the public revenue is already appropriated to pay Schoolmasters, consistently with the due advancement of the country's best interests, and its preservation from debt.

I trust, Sir, that it is unnecessary to say, that I have no feelings of hostility to the general body of Licensed Teachers in this Island, and that my only object in these letters is, to rebuke the conceited and persevering extravagance contained in your correspondent's communications. And I am happy to perceive that, in his last article, his vanity seems considerably abated, and he is willing to retract some of the presumptuous sentiments contained in his previous effusions—his attack on the legislation of the House of Assembly, on the subject of Education, to the contrary notwithstanding; but this question I am willing to leave him to settle with the heroic spirits of that august body.

THE ADVENT OF MESSIAH: By the Rev. W. DALTON, M. A., Incumbent of St. Paul's Church, Wolverhampton.

The above Lecture (being the Eleventh of the course) will (D. V.) be read in the Lecture Room, corner of Pownall and Water Streets, on Wednesday evening next, commencing at 8 o'clock.

"Brethren, the crisis of the world is come! Are we prepared for it? Can we resign all the interests of an earthly life, and identify ourselves with the will of God and spiritual excellence? Can we stand in the whirlwind, talk with the thunder, and look calmly on heaven when God looks forth with indignation on a guilty world? Are we prepared with serene joy and holy confidence to unite in the song of Moses and the Lamb, when the plagues of heaven shall fall on the wicked, and the earth shall be filled with wailing and blasphemy? Are we prepared to sympathize with man, wrecked of his hopes, and in his last extremity; and to go forth to his salvation, unmoved by the convulsions of a world, and the terrible manifestations of infinite wrath?"

"Brethren, there is still, amidst all these changes and anticipations, one sentiment which consumes us. It is not alarm lest we should witness what is most terrible to behold;—it is not hope, that we may be permitted to see those mighty movements of Providence, which, however terrific, fill the imagination with images of sublime glory: it is fear, a silent, solemn fear, lest, while anticipating these events, we should not be truly ready to meet and to improve them. Never were men placed in so extraordinary a situation. All past ages have accumulated on us their advantages; and all past ages have accumulated on us an unprecedented responsibility. On us the ends of time and of the world are come: and in our day the mystery of iniquity and the mystery of mercy are seeking their close in forms of joy and of terror, such as earth hath not seen, and such as Heaven looks down to see. Hitherto we have not been ready for this service! Are we now ready? Oh! to be ready, is to embrace a crisis for blessing man and honouring the Saviour, such as the ages of immortality may never again supply; while not to be ready, is to fall under the deathful infamy of having failed to pledge ourselves to an issue, on which is suspended the interests—not of the body, but of the soul;—not of a people, but of a world;—not of time, but of eternity. 'Prepare, O Israel, to meet thy God.' Yes, God, even our God, is coming! The day of vengeance and the day of redemption are contemporaneous. When all nations are shaken as with an earthquake, it is that 'the Desire of all nations may come.' Even now, while the powers of darkness are working, the foundations of his universal kingdom are begun. The voice of prophecy, the finger of Providence, the wickedness of the wicked, and the strange expectation in the heart of all men, tell us that he is coming. Already the streaming glory of his approach has shot across the deep darkness of our world. Already the thunder of his wheels is echoing over the distant fields of light. Yes! He, the Holy One, whose voice is harmony, whose smile is life, whose will is law, and whose law is love, is coming! And murder and oppression, and superstition, and ignorance, shall die at his feet—his throne shall be established in righteousness, and his people shall dwell in peace—man shall be restored to his right position in the world; the world to its right position in the universe; and the illimitable universe shall break forth into joy and praise over a world that was lost but is found! O Thou, who art the joy of the universe, the Saviour of the lost, whose right it is to reign, come, wear thy many crowns! Thy saints are waiting for thy coming! The earth groans for thy coming! Hell is moved at thy coming! Heaven is silent for thy coming!
