Good Progress
In Canada's
Defence Plans

OTTAWA, July 5.—(CP)—On both the Atlantic and Pacific coasts the grim muzzles of heavy guns point out from emplacements where a year ago nothing in the way of defence existed. Canadian civilian contractors and soldiers are working industriously at many points. It was learned here today, and the progress being made in providing for the protection of this country against enemy attacks is considered in the highest circles to be eminently satisfactory.

All branches of the armed forces are busy. But a considerable burden is being carried by the permanent force, whose instructional facilities this summer are taxed to the limit. The heavy demands made upon the army have moved the defence authorities to contemplate a substantial increase in military personnel. Should hostilities break out, this could be done immediately, but if the present situation continues, Parliament will next session be asked, in all likelihood, to vote additional appropriations to cover the increase.

The Wonderland Of Botany

(4. The Way of the Willows) (Science Service News)

Most people revere hepatica, and spring flowers as the first of our garden beauties to bloom, forgetting probably that the very early pussies on the willow twigs are flowers too; and which we so love to gather, bring into the home, and watch delight these grey pussies grow and gild themselves with the sunshine of their countless stamens. These are the first actual products of the river going by with the light playing in the willows; when we would send a kiss of welcome to these very trees by the gently flowing water.

As every zephyr turns the silvery whiteness of the willow leaves to be kissed by the sun; there is a riddle, so cool and so fresh—of the sweetest, of June. A mountain, but a true river song, always suggestive of the lament "Super flumina": "Upon the rivers of Babylon, there we sat and wept; when we remembered the willows in the midst thereof we hung up our instruments." (Psalm 138).

There is abundant evidence that the willows have claimed the hearts of the writers from the Old Testament times up to the present. Virgil, in his Georgics, draws attention to the habitat as being the sweetest of rivers.
