LONDON, July 20.—The Duke of Connaught inspected the bungalow of the Canadian riflemen at Bisley yesterday, and signed the visitors' book. He said the building was almost too good for a fortnight's occupation, and that it was a good thing to be a member of the Canadian team.

Dr. Colter, ex-M. P., has been appointed Postoffice Inspector of New Brunswick. The Australian premiers are expected in Ottawa about the first of August.

### THE FIGURES FOR IT.

(Montreal Gazette.)

The Laurier press is working its imagination overtime to prove that the unrevised figures of the year's financial transactions published in the last Canada Gazette indicate a reduction of taxation and an economical administration of the country's affairs during the twelve months the Liberals have been in power. As has been before explained, the figures of this statement are, and are declared to be, incomplete as records of the year's transactions. They represent only the receipts and payments that have passed through the books of the Finance Department to the 30th June, and before the closing of the year's transactions is done they will be considerably added to. Taken as they are, however, they show that in 1896-97 the Laurier Government collected more in taxes and spent more than did its Conservative predecessors in 1895-96. There are two items of taxation in the items dealt with, customs and excise. They yielded in 1895-96 the following sums:—

Customs .....	\$19,681,139
Excise .....	7,855,081
	27,536,220

The same items in 1896-97 yielded:—

Customs .....	\$19,318,363
Excise .....	9,148,915
	28,467,278

There was "wrung from the people," therefore, \$921,058 more money in taxes in the first year of the Laurier Government than in the last year of Conservative administration. There was no decrease of the public burdens in the first twelve months of the economical party's rule. The figures indicate, also, that there has been no economy. They show that on the ordinary services of the Government there was spent, in the twelve months ending with June, 1896, \$30,557,274, and in the twelve months ending with June, 1897, \$31,237,458. The Laurier Government, in the past year of its rule, spent \$166,084 more on the administrative service than its Conservative predecessors did in the last year of their control. The figures show a reduction of \$559,474 on capital expenditure, but after deducting this from the excess of ordinary outlay there is yet a balance against the Laurier Government, which, moreover, as its returns show increased the net debt from \$250,425,310 to \$254,581,529 or by \$4,156,219. These figures are not a record of tax reduction, of debt curtailment or of economy. No Liberal Government in Canada ever did reduce taxes or curtail debt or economize.
