Mr. Rhodes expresses a view sooner or later will impress Englishmen as the true one.

The following resolution, adopted by the Presbyterian synod at Winnipeg on the 15th inst., is significant: "That the synod deems it reasonable and important at this time to affirm its satisfaction with the fact that an unsectarian system of public school education has been instituted in the province of Manitoba, a portion of the bounds of this synod, and the synod would strongly deplore any change in the present system in operation in the province of Manitoba which should forbid the use of the Scriptures and religious exercises at the closing of the school, when the trustees so desire, that in view of the great importance of the religious and moral character of teachers, members of the church who are school trustees be reminded of the duty of having special regard to this qualification in their choice of teachers."

A Scotch exchange reports that Mr. Norman McLeod Cate, a nephew of Messrs. Charles and Frederick Hyndman, of this city, "has successfully passed his examinations for the degree of Master of Arts at the University of St. Andrews." The Forfar Herald states that young Cate gained second place in the competitions open to all students entering the Hall, and was "only two marks behind the first man."

They say that the money for the drawlax is taken from the people. Is this so? If there were no drawlax it would be the manufacturer and not one else who would have to pay the duty. Not a single cent would come from any other class of the community. But then, in all probability, there would be no export. The manufacturer would have to market alone for his goods. If the drawlax enables the manufacturer to make a quantity of goods over and above what is needed for the home market, is it not easy to see that when he is paid the drawlax he gets his own money back again? The community is not the loser. Suppose he imports \$1,000 worth of material and pays \$100 duty on it; when he sees that material and sends it out of the country he gets \$900 back. How is the community injured by the transaction?

THE DEMAND OF FRANCE.

Arrival of the Special Envoy Causes an Outbreak of Robberies.

Mail advices that have reached Marseilles from Madagascar show that the arrival of Antanarivo of M. L. Myre, the special envoy to present the demands of France to the Malagasy government was marked by the outbreak of robberies and incendiary fires. The government made no effort to repress the disorder. The agents of the Malagasy government were murdered by natives with assegais and their quarters sacked. One of the victims was a Frenchman, and the other a native of the island of Mauritius.

Prince Rakotonana and other relatives of the queen are preaching a holy war. Tanatics harangue the people, and are stirring them against the French by displaying the hearts and entrails of children found, they declare, in French residences. The Hovas, the ruling tribe, declare that the French kill and eat children. The Hova government has promised to protect English missionaries.

THE ARMENIAN MASSACRE.

Two Hundred Women Refused to Deny Christ and Were Killed.

M. H. Guellian, Secretary of the United Friends of Armenia, a Boston organization, has received a letter from a friend, dated Sasson, of Bitlis, October 3, in which he gives an account of the massacre of his fellow-countrymen and women. He stated that thousands have been hacked to pieces, and that in one instance seven men were covered with kerosene and set on fire. On another occasion, he says, two hundred women, with their children, were in a church with their priest, on their knees imploring the commandant to have mercy on them. They were informed that if they would renounce the Christian religion and return to Mohammedanism they would not be harmed. They replied that they had no reason to deny Christ, and they were killed.

It is said that the Duke of Westminster has settled upon Prince Adolphus of Teck, who is to marry his daughter, a dowry of \$500,000 and \$25,000 upon the young couple. The wedding is expected this week.

A despatch to the London Times, from Buenos Ayres, says: Admiral Saldanha da Gama, one of the Brazilian insurgents, states that the revolutionary chiefs have definitely determined not to accept the presidency of Prudente de Moraes.

When Canada wanted a loan the other day, among those anxious to lend were United States banks, which actually offered the Canadian offers sent in, and thus obtained a block of the stock. Interested politicians at Ottawa may talk, but the financiers know a good thing when they see it. No higher comment is needed than this has come from over the border in many years.

GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Rome, Nov. 22. In circles close to the Vatican belief is expressed that Monsignor Lorenzelli, papal nuncio to the Netherlands, will eventually be appointed apostolic delegate to the United States, to succeed Mgr. Satolli. It is said, however, that the date of Mgr. Satolli's recall has not yet been fixed, and it is understood that his return to Rome, if he does his return, will be contingent upon his elevation to the cardinalate.

Berlin, Nov. 22.—The Cologne Gazette prints a long reply to the article which appeared in the London Standard of Nov. 16, analyzing the position of Germany in Europe and defining the relations of the Empire to England. The Gazette denies the assertion that the Driedburg is dissolving because Italy thinks England's help was needed. On the contrary, the Driedburg is stronger since England's maneuvers. The fact is that Anglo-German relations have become very much worse of late. Germany, the Gazette declares, will not endure England as an obstacle in her colonial policy. England knows Germany has both the strength and the will to prevent any such action.

BEBA PESTI, Nov. 22.—Franz Kossuth, son of the late Hungarian patriot, Louis Kossuth has abandoned his tour of Hungary on account of the excitement it has created. The Hungarian government yesterday interpellated on the subject of Kossuth by Deputy Busbach, who declared that Kossuth had attacked the Hungarian constitution and incited the emperor-king. Herr Busbach also wanted information as to why the government allowed Kossuth, who he said, was a foreigner, to travel in Hungary. The minister of the interior, Baron Hierony, said that action could be taken against Kossuth as a foreigner, for the reason that the steps he had taken to secure naturalization pointed out that he intended to become a Hungarian subject. The minister added that the alleged insults to the emperor-king were being officially investigated into.

LONDON, Nov. 23.—A St. Petersburg despatch to the Standard says that at a meeting of the state council Wednesday, the czar created a highly favorable impression by a display of unexpected oratorical fluency and his masterly grasp of the political questions submitted for his judgment. His Majesty is winning golden opinions on all sides by showing that he is fully equal to his onerous position.

LONDON, Nov. 22.—Australian mail advices are to the effect that the Kanakas on all the islands near New Guinea are in revolt. Scores of European settlers have been murdered. The steamer Thurens, of Sydney, called at the Admiralty Islands and found that the trading posts and a trading schooner had been burned. Not a single white man was left. They were natives fled to the hills on the approach of the steamer. The captain headed and found the remains of a recent cannibal feast. All the whites undoubtedly met with a horrible death. At New Ireland and other islands similar massacres are reported. It is supposed that the natives looted liquor stores, and becoming inflamed with the spoils, massacred the whites.

OTTAWA, Nov. 24. Joseph Pope's memoirs of Sir John Macdonald were brought out yesterday. The book promises to create a great sensation. It gives the inside history of Canadian politics for the last forty years. One of the most interesting features of the volume is Sir John's proposal for the settlement of the Irish Home Rule question. It is contained in a letter to Lord Lisgar, who was then Governor-General of Canada, and suggests the formation of four grand councils. This is the scheme which Joseph Chamberlain has adhered to.

LONDON, Nov. 24. A despatch from Shanghai says that the Japanese captured Port Arthur on Wednesday evening. The fighting began Tuesday. The Chinese made an unusually strong defense. The fighting was severe and incessant for fully fifty hours. Both sides are reported to have lost heavily.

THE CZAR NOT TO BE RULED. Arrest of the Chief of Police. LONDON, Nov. 24. A St. Petersburg despatch says that the czar is displaying unexpected energy. He has placed the Chief of the St. Petersburg Police under arrest for three days in his own residence for ordering the Countess Strongaloff's mourning decorations removed, because they were erected without police permission; also for treating foreign newspaper reporters badly.

THE LONDON SCHOOL BOARD ELECTION. LONDON, Nov. 24. The Central News sends out a statement that the new School Board will contain 29 clericals and 26 progressives. This is approximately correct. In every division except one the progressives headed the polls. The total progressive vote was 706,206; total clerical vote, 612,622.
