United Church W.M.S. Rally Held At Alberton

"God Waits Our Best" was the theme of a United Church W. M. S. Rally held yesterday afternoon July 8th, in Alberton Church. Representatives from twelve churches in the West Prince County were represented by about eighty of their members and a number of visitors increase the total attendance to one hundred or more. Plans for the rally were made by Mrs. R. F. McAusland, a vice-president of the Prince Edward Island Presbyterian, and Mrs. A. W. Craswell, presidential secretary for Mission Bands. Mrs. Craswell presided. Other Presbyterian officers present were Mrs. Hazen Howard, president, Mrs. F. W. Cutcliffe, Mrs. Stanley Thompson and Mrs. Allison Tait. Rev. Roy McNaught, missionary on furlough from Central America was guest speaker. Opening worship, led by Mrs. A. R. Wallis of Alberton was based on the theme of the rally and stressed the thought that God wants our best selves and our best service. As part of the rally call to worship Miss Shirley Wallis sweetly rendered "There Is A Place of Quiet Rest." A demonstration auxiliary meeting was presented by members of Alberton Auxiliary with Mrs. Fred Leard presenting the study. Mrs. Craswell then took charge of the meeting, speaking briefly on its important and challenging theme. On behalf of Alberton Auxiliary Mrs. A. C. Green welcomed the rally to Alberton and Mrs. Angus McLean of Lot 14 made reply. Twelve auxiliaries responded to the rally call; two others in the rally area were unable to be present. A member of each auxiliary gave the highlights of its year's work. Of particular interest was the fact that Montrose and Alma Auxiliaries (originally one group) had celebrated the sixtieth anniversary of their organization. Five members of O'Leary Mission Band, directed by their leader, Mrs. McPherson, pleased the rally with their singing of a song of thanksgiving. A very fine report of the Maritime branch of the W. M. Interesting Address
In expressing his pleasure at being present to address the rally, Rev. Mr. McNaught made reference to the women's society in his church in San Salvador, terming it "The power house of the Church." Results of mission work were excellently illustrated as Mr. McNaught proceeded to outline briefly the life and work of four El Salvador Christians well known to him. A very happy feature of the rally, and an expected one, was the introduction by Mr. McNaught of a young lady from San Salvador who has been a member of his household for some years and who is now visiting Prince Edward Island with Mr. and Mrs. McNaught. While this young lady is familiar with the English language she preferred to speak in her more familiar native tongue and Mr. McNaught interpreted her message. The story she told was that when she was four years old there was a revolution in the little town where she was born and in it her father was killed. A little while after that her mother, who was very poor, had to place her children in an orphanage. "But," she said, "God prepared a place for my sister and me. It was in the home of the missionaries and there I have had many privileges both material and spiritual. I was able to graduate from school and in the last five years I have taught school and have also had a Sunday school class and there I have been able to speak to the little children about my Saviour." Messages were received from a number of Presbyterian officers and Mrs. Allison Tait introduced a number of missionary and devotional books. The closing worship, led by Elmsdale Auxiliary left with those present the reassuring yet challenging thought that God can use our small gifts to accomplish great things and that as we give ourselves and all we have so will he use us to accomplish His purpose. Death Yesterday Of Mrs. Joseph Bernard

Mrs. Joseph Bernard, wife of Hon. Joseph Bernard former Lieutenant Governor, passed away at their home in Tignish at an early hour yesterday morning.

Mrs. Bernard had been in failing health since shortly after Christmas when she was brought to Charlottetown for treatment and the entire family summoned home. She rallied and eventually returned home where her daughter Norma, a Registered Nurse, has been caring for her ever since, having been granted an extended leave from her acceptance in the R. C. N. as a nursing sister.

Mrs. Bernard was well known throughout the Province but more particularly in later days in the city when as the lady of the incumbent at Government House, her natural kindness and courtesy added greatly to the enjoyment of many social functions. For many years she was a devout and valued member of the Catholic Women's League, serving as Provincial President for one term.

The former Miss Zoe Chaisson of Tignish, she was married in September, 1919. Besides her sorrowing husband, seven sons and six daughters survive. The sons are, Walter and Omer, in Tignish, Brother Ralph, I.M.O., Ottawa, Elphege, a Captain in the Canadian Army at Fredericton, N. B., Harold, employer at the Imperial Oil Co., Charlottetown, Cecil, Assistant Manager Lord Elgin Hotel, Ottawa and Timothy, Welland, Ont.

Alberton South Fisherman Gets Large Lobster

On Saturday, July 5th, the final day of the lobster fishing season on the north shore, Mr. Clarence Powers of Alberton South brought in with his catch a large lobster weighing eight and one quarter pounds, the largest landed in the area during the season. It was weighed by Jack Matthews, manager of Alberton Fisheries Ltd. and as it was soft shelled and a good color unlike most huge lobsters which are hard shelled and black, it was selected as a market lobster and will eventually end up on the Boston market. It was entangled on the outside of the trap as lobsters of this size are unable to get through the openings in an ordinary trap which probably explains why more of this unusually size are not caught. Fishermen at Alberton South generally had a very good season with boats belonging to Hutt, Cecil Hutt and Frank McNeill having landed over 20,000 pounds each, which is considerably more than last year. At the Union Factory the total pack is expected to be three hundred cases over last year's total.

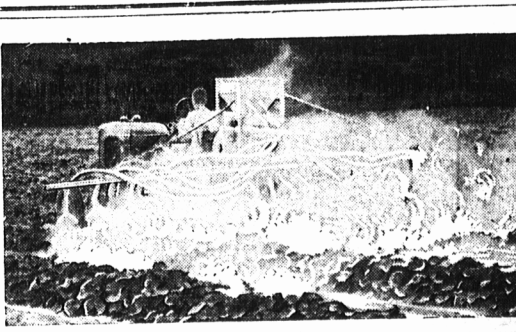

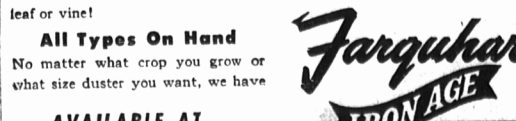
