THE TUPPER CLUB.

Splendid Meeting Last Night Able Speeches.

The meeting of the Tupper Club last night was one of the best held since the club was established. The attendance was large, and great enthusiasm prevailed. The different speakers scored many points against the band of incapables now in power at Ottawa, and their remarks were roundly applauded.

Ex-Councillor Nicholson started the ball rolling by criticising the conduct of the government in the matter of kerosene oil and other necessities. He also gave some very interesting and encouraging reports from the country districts, speaking with special reference to those parts in which he had attended meetings.

Mr. J. T. Mellish spoke largely upon the questions of preferential tariff, the sending of the troops to Africa, and the Yukon matter, showing the unstatesmanlike course pursued by the New Liberals on these points. He paid a deserved tribute to the work being done by the young men in this campaign, and predicted a Conservative victory all along the line. So far as Nova Scotia was concerned his information was that it would be two to one in the Conservatives' favor.

Mr. J. A. Messervey dealt with the question of prosperity, showing that whatever measure we enjoy is due to the far-seeing policy of the Liberal-Conservatives. It was the Conservatives who brought about confederation, and built the C. P. R. The work of Sir Charles Tupper while High Commissioner, and the lectures of Professor Robertson had done much towards developing our export trade with Great Britain, and the work now being done there by the C. P. R. agents was also contributing largely towards the same end. Steamship lines, he showed, were a valuable aid towards the development of trade. In this connection Mr. Messervey showed what could be done if a direct steamship service were established between this port and Great Britain, the West Indies, and criticised the Government for its failure to provide such service. He also dealt with the Newfoundland market, pointing out that during the entire period of Liberal administration no effort was made to bring that colony into the confederation. The opening up of this market would be a great boon to Prince Edward Island. At the present time the duty on potatoes in Newfoundland is 10c, on turnips 20c, and on oats 6c, with a duty of about 30 per cent on other goods. He failed to notice the increase in labor referred to by the Liberal press; and the captains of vessels will tell you they never had a duller season than the present one.

Mr. Joseph Wise, ex-M. P., one of the Old Liberals, spoke next, referring to the failure of Sir Louis and his colleagues to keep their pre-election promises. Mr. Wise dealt at considerable length with our markets abroad, pointing out the failure of the Liberals to obtain free trade with the United States. He gave a most encouraging report from the Milton poll, showing that there was a decided change there in favor of Mr. Stewart.

Mr. A. E. Lyon, who came to Charlottetown from Ontario something over a year ago, spoke after Mr. Wise. He criticised the conduct of Sir Louis and his colleagues with regard to the winter service, referring to the early withdrawal from this port last fall of the steamer Minto. Speaking of the prospects of the Conservatives all over Canada, Mr. Lyon pointed out that they were excellent. He had private advices from reliable sources in Ontario to the effect that the Conservative majority in that province would be 24 with a fighting chance for 32. The history of Canada, he said, contains no instance of the Liberals winning from the Conservatives except when the latter were divided. The Conservatives were divided on the Pacific scandal in 1874 and in 1896 the School question separated them. The Conservatives were united now. He showed that Sir Louis had during the past four years done very well for himself. He had drawn \$8,000 a year salary and had received \$2,600 for his junkets to Quebec and Washington. He had also obtained a title. Mr. Lyon closed his able and instructive address with some excellent advice regarding the canvass.

Other speakers were Councillor Tanton, James Paton, E. T. Carbonell and Dr. Bagnall, each of whom made excellent addresses.

—The funeral of Mrs. Samuel Batt and Mr. Nelson D. Armour took place this afternoon. Both were largely attended.

—A musical entertainment under the direction of the Ladies Aid of the First Methodist Church will be given in Kindergarten Hall on the evening of Nov. 22.

—A public meeting and entertainment will be held in Victoria Division room, Wright's Hall, at 8 o'clock. Homemade candy. Silver collection at the door.

—The Rev. Wm. Driffield, who is to preach in St. Peter's Cathedral tomorrow night, is expected by the mail train this evening, and will be the guest of the Master of the Rolls.

—The meeting in the Market Hall tonight, will be addressed by Sir Louis Davies and Mr. W. S. Stewart, the people's candidate, in the order named. All the electors should attend.

—For the reception of the returning Islanders the Steam Navigation Co. has put a line of incandescent lights along the front of its wharf and up the west side for a considerable distance.

—A message was received today by Mr. George E. Hughes, of this city, from Mayor Campbell saying that about eighty dollars has been subscribed in Summerside so far toward the purse for the returning soldiers. This is really splendid.

—Mr. Farquharson challenged Mr. Martin and Mr. McLean to disprove certain statements of his, but when he concluded his speech he departed from the meeting through the window—probably to attend to the business connected with the reception of our brave soldiers.

—The Postmaster at Charlottetown has been instructed that a limited quantity of newspapers will be accepted by the Department for transmission to the Yukon Territory and the Atlin District. This cancels the former notice that newspapers, etc. could not be forwarded.

—There was a great meeting at Wiltshire last evening. The speakers were Sir Louis Davies, Senator Ferguson, Dr. Douglass, Dr. McNellie, Mr. John Balderson and Mr. McCourt. The two first spoke for an hour and a half each. When Senator Ferguson ended there wasn't much of Sir Louis' plea for Laurier, Tarte & Co. left standing.

—The different societies intending to parade at the reception of the South African soldiers on arrival at Charlottetown are requested to send their marshals to meet together at the City Hall tomorrow (Thursday) morning at nine o'clock, to make final arrangements regarding procession, etc. D. L. Hooper, Chief Marshal.

—People who were present at the Grandview meeting assure us that the Patriot's report is utterly lacking in the essential element. The meeting was a great success from the Conservative standpoint. Both Mr. Martin and Mr. McLean made excellent speeches and each received a splendid hearing. The only man who disturbed the meeting was a brother-in-law of Mr. D. A. McKinnon, the Liberal candidate.

—A contribution of fifty dollars was sent in this morning by Mr. Arthur S. Cameron from the residents of Montague. Word has been received from Georgetown that thirty dollars have been collected there for the fund. Souris also sends in another list making the total in cash from that place reach the splendid sum of forty-five dollars. In all King's County will contribute about \$125.
