Today five of the victims have returned to their jobs, with new health and happiness. Two others will return to work in the near future. The eighth is still in hospital suffering from a different disease, and the ninth died two months ago.

Rheumatic fever had damaged the valve between the two left chambers of the victim's heart until the valves were nearly closed. The amazing operations were performed by Drs. Bailey and Klown of Philadelphia and were the first of their kind performed inside the living heart.

Science and the skill of surgeons—has performed seeming miracles during these past 25 years.
