British Appreciation of an Imperial Statesman.

Canadians will not be surprised that the patriotic and noble position so consistently maintained by the Conservative Premier of this British Dominion has aroused a warm and enthusiastic response from the hearts of our fellow citizens across the seas. Cabled extracts, such as that from the St. James Gazette, expressing British "fondness for the fair young daughter of the Empire," give but a faint idea of the volumes of editorial comment and general criticism which the elections in Canada and the general interest felt in the result have aroused in the British press.

The following resolution passed by one of the largest branches of the great organization known as the Primrose League, which is pledged, amongst other things, to preserve the "Imperial ascendancy of the British Empire," will be duly appreciated, not only as a great personal compliment to our Conservative chieftain, but as an emphatic assertion of Imperial regard for the Canadian Dominion:

To Sir John Macdonald, Premier of Canada. "Weas loyal subjects of our Queen and supporters of the British Empire, send you warmest greetings and heartfelt thanks for the patriotic stand you have so nobly made in defence of the maintenance of the Empire; and although for the time being, dangers may menace that unity between Canada and the Mother Country, we feel that the patriotism of our fellow-countrymen in Canada will not allow them to swerve from their duty to the heritage of glory handed down to them in trust for posterity, but that they like ourselves in the Old Country, will fight shoulder to shoulder against that valiant treason which has for its object the disintegration and dismemberment of our Empire, which has stood immovable amid the ages of man and the downfall of nations.

"We feel sure that the energy of character, skill, daring and indomitable valor exercised by our forefathers in England and the colonies will stimulate us, whether in Canada or in England, to rally round the flag of our Empire, upon whose dominions the sun never sets, under whose folds has been developed a degree of national felicity and comfort more rich and uninterrupted than has ever been enjoyed by any other empire in the world's history.

"We feel satisfied that with such guides as yourself the future of our Empire is safe, and its progress secure. We therefore pray that your valuable life may be long spared to still carry out your noble work in defence of our national principles of empire and liberty.

Our Book Table.

A DOUBLE KNOT, by Geo. Manville Fenn. This story is in the case with all by the same author, is much better than the usual run of novels. It is a clever inter-weaving of the plots of two stories with separate characters, and we are treated to plenty of the most sensational fiction. The book tells of two lovely girls who have been brought up under the strict care of maiden aunts; their subsequent adventures furnish our author with the material for an enjoyable story.

NAME AND FAME, by Adeline Sergeant. A story of an altogether too clever woman, too clever to be lovable, who falls in love with a poet whose wife is still alive. The trouble which ensues, and which makes this case of "true love" unorthodox, is smoothly, and all told in the story, and really everything ends happily. Not so good as "A Double Knot" but not uninteresting.

WORMWOOD, by Marie Corelli, will find many readers, and it is worth reading. The sensations experienced by, and the adventures which befall a Paris adolescent are vividly described, and light is thrown upon the misery and squalor existing among the poor of the French capital, by whom, according to the novelist, the vice of absinthe drinking is indulged in to a terrible extent. There are some good passages in this book, better than one generally finds between the paper covers of the modern novel. Whoever reads this story will, we venture to say enjoy it.

A HIDDEN FOE, by G. A. Henty. A good story and one that will make many readers, who do not already know the writer, acquainted with a novelist whose books are meeting with merited popularity.

Furious Floods.

SUPPLEMENTED BY A DEATH-DEALING CYCLONE.

A Pickens, Miss., despatch of March 9th, says: Continued rain since Thursday night raised the water in Big Back River higher than ever known and it is still raining rapidly. It is up to the floor of the bridge. All other bridges in the country are gone and communication is cut off. The Illinois Central Railroad track was lifted bodily from its bed and deposited in a ditch. For miles below and above here the embankment was swept and incalculable damage done by water. A cyclone passed over this place on Saturday morning without doing any damage, dropping over in Madison county, where it caused great destruction of life and property. Passing into Atala county near Newport many houses were blown down and four Negroes killed. The town of Evesprize was inundated to a large extent. The flood has no parallel save in the memorable year 1871.

VALUABLE HORSE LOST.—We regret exceedingly to hear that Mr. Hugh Campbell, of North Wiltshire, lost a valuable horse on Tuesday night, 3rd inst. It appears that the animal in some unaccountable way got his head under the brake in his stall and in trying to get out broke his neck. When Mr. Campbell went to the stable on Wednesday morning he found the animal dead with his neck broken. The owner, we understand, would not take \$100 for the horse. Mr. Campbell is the father of the lad who had a portion of his hand shot off at North Wiltshire last fall.

Carter's Prize Prolific Barley.

In February, 1890, the Government of Canada, on the recommendation of the Hon. the Minister of Agriculture, made provision for the importation of 10,000 bushels of two-rowed barley from England, to be sold to the farmers in Canada for seed. This was imported in 5,000 bags of 112 lbs. each, the "Prize Prolific" being the variety chosen for the purpose, and this barley was offered at the cost of importation, \$4 per bag, the Government paying freight charges to the nearest railway station to the purchaser. By this arrangement, farmers in every part of the Dominion obtained the barley at a uniform price, but one bag only was available to each individual. This restriction was made at the outset so as to secure a wider distribution for the grain, and prevent a too rapid exhaustion of the stock, so that applicants from distant portions of the Dominion might not be disappointed. This limitation lessened the sales, and as soon as it was ascertained that the barley on hand would be more than sufficient to meet the demand on the basis of one bag only for each purchaser, the restriction was withdrawn. About 3,200 bags were sold to 2,600 purchasers, leaving nearly 1,800 bags on hand.

I am now instructed to offer the remaining stock at three dollars per bag, freight prepaid to the nearest railway station to the purchaser, with no restrictions as to the number of bags which any individual may buy. All orders must be accompanied by a remittance sufficient to cover the amount of the order. The applications will be entered as received and the orders filled in rotation as long as the stock holds out.

The germ sowing power of this barley has been tested in ten samples taken from different bags, the average vitality is 90 per cent., and the growth strong.

Telegraph Cables.

When it is considered that some 10,000 messages daily are sent over the 10 cables connecting Europe and North America, something will be realized of the present importance of submarine telegraphy. The cables of the world, according to Mr. Geo. W. Niven, now number 1045, of which 798 belong to governments and 247 to private companies. The total length is 120,070 nautical miles, of which 107,547 miles are owned by private telegraph companies, nearly all British, and 12,524 by governments. The Eastern Telegraphic Company has 70 cables of a total length of 12,838 nautical miles. The British Government has 103 home cables of a total length of 1489 miles, and 216 colonial cables of a total length of 3811 miles. Of the other government cables, Norway has 736, averaging less than a mile each. The longest cable extends from Brest, France, to St. Pierre Miquelon, a small island off the south coast of Newfoundland, and measures 2585 nautical, or 3092 statute miles. The oldest cable in use is the one first laid that from Dover to Calais—and dates from 1851.

The War Shadow.

FRANCE INCREASING HER STOCK OF CARTRIDGES—M HERBETTE TALKS.

The Echo de Paris says that the utmost activity now prevails at the military works at Bourges, the Department of War having ordered the amount of cartridges ordinarily produced to be doubled.

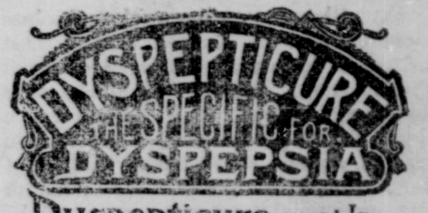
The XIXme Siecle publishes an interview with M. Herbet, the Ambassador of France, at Berlin, in which the Minister says that he considers that in refusing to exhibit at Berlin the French artists obeyed the mandates of a few blusterers. It was, he said, illogical for artists who presented their works at Stuttgart and Munich to decline to do so at Berlin.

With regard to the recent visit of the Empress to Paris, M. Herbet said that it was perhaps imprudent, and added that it was undertaken without any one having been consulted thereto. The Minister denied that he had been sounded on the subject of the Imperial journey, and asserted that the French Government had not been advised of the purpose of the ex-Empress until the day before she arrived in the capital.
