Internationals Carry Story of Atom Attack



A 10,000 mile, coast-to-coast journey is engaging these International trucks! They are a part of the Civil Defence Convoy, transporting the Civil Defence exhibit to most of Canada's leading cities. The eleven-vehicle convoy includes seven International Roadliners, pulling 34-foot trailers, each of which carries a part of the multiple exhibit; also two International Travelalls to carry convoy personnel, an International stake body to transport the large 3-ton generator required for the exhibit, and a gasoline tanker, mounted on an International chassis.

The seven truck tractors and two Travelalls have been especially built by International Harvester and have been loaned by them to the government for the duration of the convoy. Half the exhibit drives home the reality and nature of the threat that faces Canada. The second half spells out specifically what the individual citizen can do to meet this threat, and how Civil Defence services are organized at the provincial and local levels.
