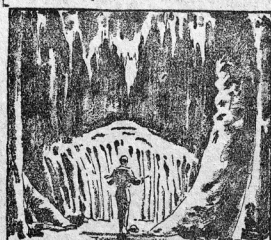

was furthermore a distinct possibility my hand was such that five hearts could be made, or else that five hearts would prove to be a good sacrifice bid.

In any case, he guessed wrong and bid five hearts. Siniscalco doubled and he went down two — 300 points — losing three spade and a club.

At the other table the bidding went as follows:

The Italian pair were also using 2 bids similar to ours. Belladonna opened with two hearts. Silodor took a view different from Forquet's and bid two spades.

When Avarelli's four heart bid rolled around to Silodor, he could not be blamed for bidding four spades with his tempting hand, not only because there appeared to be a genuine chance of making the contract, but also because it seemed extremely likely four hearts would be made.

Silodor lost three diamonds and a heart. Down one — a 200 points. So the American team lost 500 points on the deal which, translated into IMPs, cost us 6 points. Again it is not easy to point the finger to blame. Was Crawford's judgment bad, or was Silodor at fault for not using Forquet's hurry-up tactics? Or was it just one of those things?

Opening lead — ace of spades. This hand came up in the second session of the match against the Italian, in the course of which the American team lost 11 IMPs to fall 25 points behind Italy.

The bidding at my table found our side in the five level before the first round of bidding was complete. Crawford and I were playing weak two bids, which accounts for my opening bid. The two bid indicated a hand of less than normal opening bid strength.

Forquet countered by leaping to four spades. Crawford was now faced with a difficult proposition. Despite his high card strength there was no assurance that our spades could be beaten, and there

Irish Premier Hedges On Union

LONDON (Reuters) — Premier Eamonn de Valera of Southern Ireland Tuesday would not commit himself on the possibility of his country rejoining the British Commonwealth.

At a press conference here he was asked whether he would be ready to bring the 26 counties of Southern Ireland into Commonwealth as a condition of reunification his replies to the 6 counties of Northern Ireland, now part of the United Kingdom.

"The question of a united Ireland," the premier said, "would necessarily mean that some adjustment would have to be made when the six counties joined the 26. The question of our relations with the British Commonwealth would then have to be settled."

The premier of the Southern Irish republic said also that he would like to see the United States use its good offices to end the partition of Southern and Northern Ireland.

"There is no principle of right and justice on which the present division of our country can be based," he said.

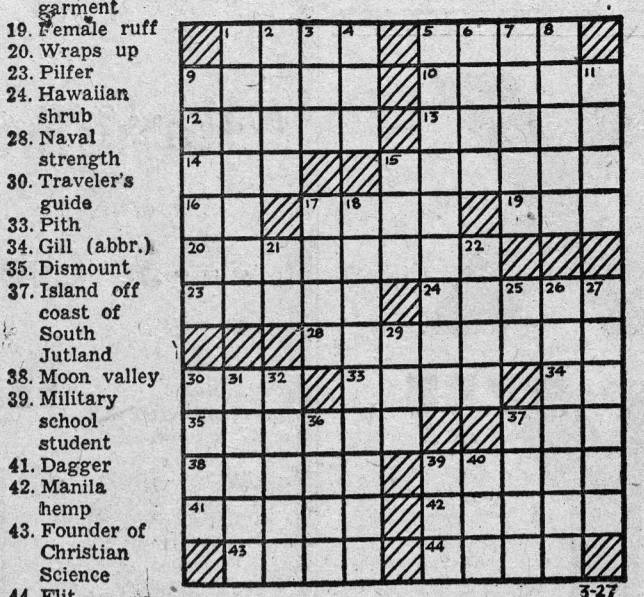
Canadian Oil Co. Profits Higher

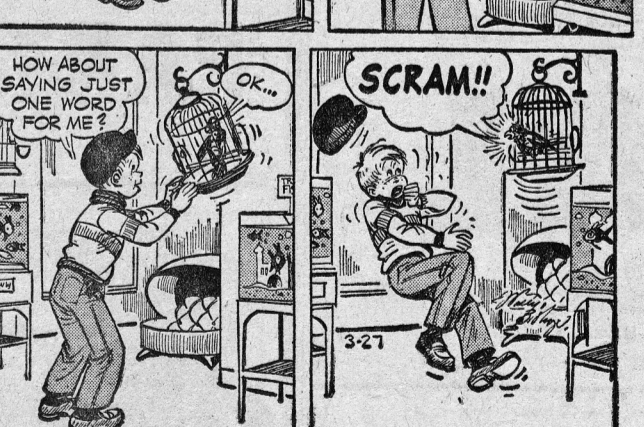

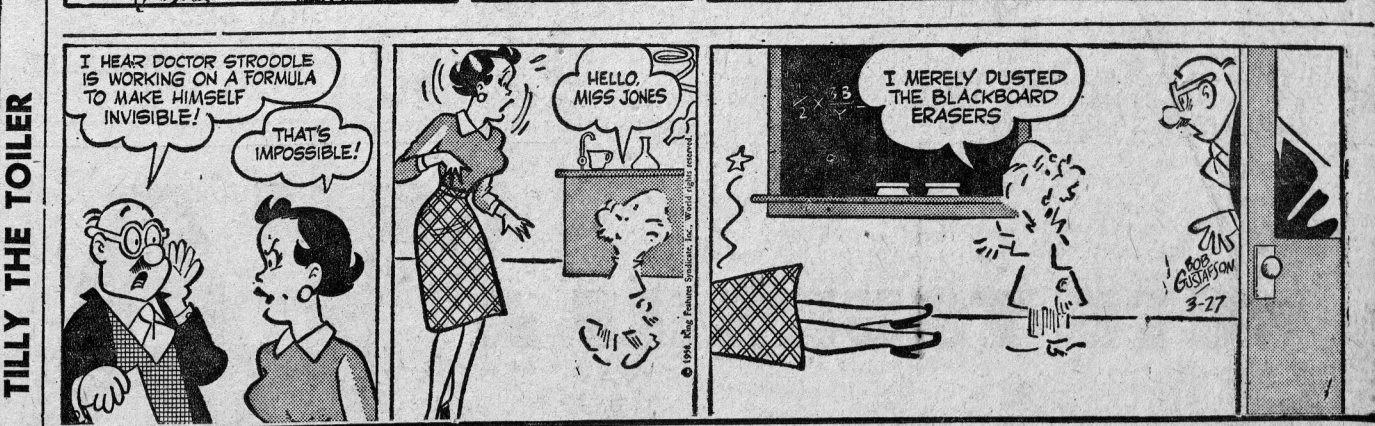

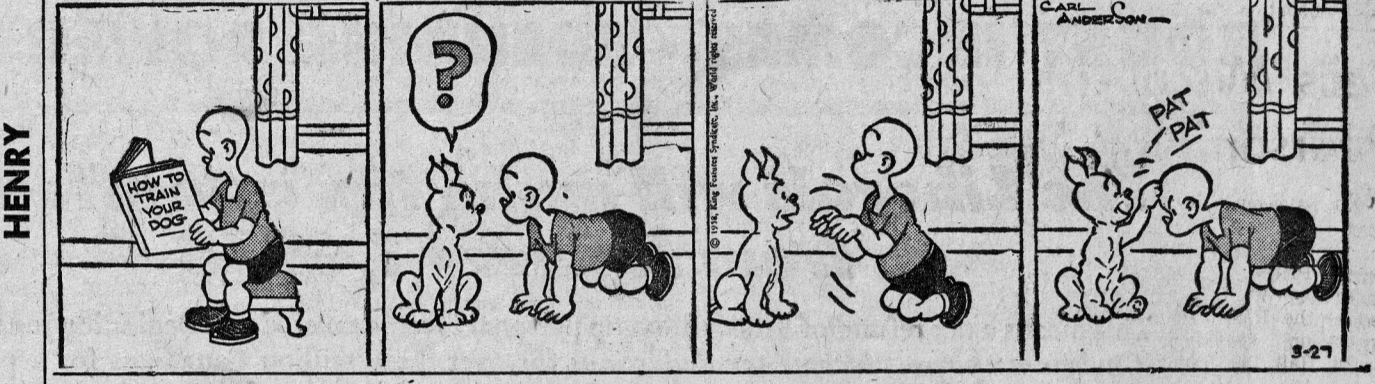
