MONDAY

The death occurred at his home in Summerside on Sunday morning at seven o'clock of Maynard Freeman Schurman, President of M. P. Schurman Co. Ltd. in his 70th year. Death came peacefully after an illness of two weeks, and brought to a close a life of one of Prince Edward Island's truly great men, a life of great achievement devoted not only to the advancement of the company which bears his name, but dedicated to all matters concerning the betterment of the community in which he lived.

It was well and truly said of him by his life long friend, Dr. John MacNeill: "He interested himself in all things that were for the betterment of his friends, his neighbours, and the community at large."

The stirring music of the Road to the Isles Saturday night concert, the start of another of the big Festive Week programs, came from the bagpipes of the Cape Breton Highlanders playing on the lawn of the Armouries.

The roadway around Government Pond was lined almost solidly with cars with people who came to hear the first of many concerts provided by bands from here and elsewhere. Yesterday afternoon concerts were also given at the two local hospitals and at the Sanatorium.

Last night a huge crowd packed the area around Memorial Field to hear the crack band of H. M. C. S. Stadacona, Halifax, in a special evening concert.

The death occurred suddenly at about 6 p.m. yesterday at his residence 168 Queen St. of Mr. Arthur E. Tomlins, aged 59, well known commercial traveller and for the past 20 years a competent and valued employee of the Rogers Hardware Company of the city.

Mr. Tomlins, who covered the Island for many years as a travelling salesman for P. W. Turner and Co., was well and favourably known among the business fraternity, with whom he had dealings, in every village and hamlet of the province.

Becoming suddenly ill as he was having his evening meal, he passed away before medical aid could be summoned.

It was announced yesterday that the Rt. Rev. Bishop R. H. Waterman, Lord Bishop of the Diocese of Nova Scotia, has appointed the Rev. Gerald E. Moffat to succeed Rev. Canon E. M. Malone, D.D., as incumbent of St. Peter's Cathedral.

The Rev. Mr. Moffat, at present incumbent of St. Paul's Church,

Lorne Park, Toronto, is a graduate of Rothesay Collegiate, Bishop's University, and the Faculty of Divinity of Trinity College, University of Toronto, and holds Master's degrees in Arts and Bachelor of Divinity degrees. He was for a time a master at K.C.S., Windsor. Mr. Moffat is a son of Canon E. K. Moffat, Rector of the Church of the Advent, Sherbrooke, P.Q., a lecturer for many years at Bishop's College.

The Rev. Mr. Moffat will assume his duties as incumbent of St. Peter's in late September, when Canon Malone, who is resigning after thirty one years incumbency will go to Halifax to lecture for a year at King's College.

At Miminegash Run late Friday night the mooring lines of the Ran-A-Tan, a large launch equipped for harvesting Irish moss, were cut in what was believed to be a deliberate attempt to sabotage the vessel.

Mr. Leonard Vatcher, and a second man whose name could not be learned, who were sleeping aboard awoke just as the boat was drifting out the harbour entrance. They managed to get the engines started barely in time to prevent the boat from drifting into the breakers at the entrance of the Run where they would have grounded with possible damage.

It is understood an investigation is underway by the R. C. M. P. in cooperation with the Fisheries Department.

A Medal of Merit and Bars to two other Medals previously given have been awarded to three Island people for outstanding work in the Boy Scouts Association. Those taking the awards are Mr. Kenneth M. Martin, Q.C. (Medal of Merit), Mr. Robert C. Parent (Bar) and Mrs. R. C. Parent (Bar).

Announcement of the awards, which are given with the approval of His Excellency the Governor General of Canada, was made last night. Mr. Martin is a well known attorney here and is City Recorder. Mr. Parent is the Superintendent of the Experimental Farm where he resides with Mrs. Parent.

Mr. Harry Rafuse, 53, was found dead early yesterday morning on the Georgetown Royalty Road, apparently killed by a motor vehicle. Yesterday afternoon R. C. M. P. placed under arrest, Rodrick Jeremiah Stevie of Cardigan and last night they took into custody Wendell Nicholson, also of Cardigan. The men are being held in connection with the accident and will appear in court at Georgetown today.

There were few details available. The body was found shortly after 7 a.m. yesterday by Miss Annie Keenan who was en route to her home at Georgetown. The body was lying directly across the road, it was reported. The body was found on the Georgetown Royalty Road and was three miles from Cardigan and a mile and a half from the man's home on the Georgetown Road.

Mrs. Benjamin Rogers, Senior, died early yesterday morning at her home at 101 Brighton Road after an illness of eight months.

The former Miss Winifred Louise Collings, she was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Collings of this city. Last February she and Mr. Rogers celebrated their golden wedding anniversary.

The kids were dancing in classified groups to decide the winners of the special Festive Week medals for the Highland Fling and Sword Dancing.

The splendid group, trained and directed by Pipe Major Wilfred Burke and Mrs. Burke, gave many selections during the evening and individual members carried off a fair share of the dancing prizes as well.

OTTAWA, July 30 — (Special) — An appeal entered by the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board against a judgment of the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island which declared that the Federal Agricultural Products Marketing Act was invalid, was upheld in a judgment handed down today by the Supreme Court of Canada.

While the P. E. I. Potato Marketing Board won on principle, the Supreme Court ruled that the Board had no right to impose or collect a fee of one cent per hundred pounds of potatoes shipped or exported. Imposition of the fee was held to be an unconstitutional attempt to permit the Board to finance its marketing plans. How it will carry out these plans with its course of funds cut off, is a problem for the Board, the Provincial Government and the Federal Government.

Thousands of cheering citizens lined the streets for the big Ser-

VICES parade Monday night and they remained till the end despite the suddenly chilly weather. It was the largest parade seen locally since Festive Week of last year.

Beginning at Victoria Park the mile-long procession wound through streets lined solidly with people of all ages. At its close up Queen street from Water street the "eyes right" order was heard as His Honor Lieutenant Governor T. W. L. Prowse took the salute from a base in front of the Market Building. He was accompanied by Naval aide Capt. J. J. Connelly, R.C.A.F. aide Pitt Lieut. A. Macmillan and Acting Mayor T. Roy Cudmore.

The parade was headed by Brig. W. W. Reid, D.S.O., E.D., and leading with him were Brig. G. K. Peake, D.S.O., E.D., Col. J. H. Shaw, Maj. J. T. Davis, Maj. R. D. MacGillivray and Capt. O. Simons. Directly behind them was the Naval band from H. M. C. S. Stadacona, Halifax. They were followed by the naval detachment from H.M.C.S. Queen Charlotte under command of Lieut. Commander J. J. Trainor. Next in line were the Sea Cadets of Kent County commanded by Lieut. J. W. D. Smallwood.

It was entirely a kids show at the Forum Monday evening when the youngsters paraded their bicycles, doll wagons and pets in the annual show put on in connection with Festive Week which concluded yesterday.

The judges present had a wide variety of items to examine in every class, but the prizes were finally awarded to a large group of the little ones for their initiative and originality.

THURSDAY

Another increase in traffic on the Northumberland Ferries Wood Islands-Caribou route was shown last month by comparison with 1951. All classes, passenger, automobile and truck, showed higher figures this year. The corresponding month last year, the traffic figures for this June, with last year's in brackets, are: passengers, 9,875 (9,750); automobiles, 2,592 (2,522); trucks, 779 (764).

OTTAWA, July 3 — (Special) — Disapproval of the principle of dual ridings in the Federal representation picture was voiced in the House of Commons last night by J. Angus MacLean, joint Progressive Conservative member for Queens. Mr. MacLean expressed the hope that at the next Federal redistribution, dual ridings will be eliminated altogether, as most of them in Canada have already.

Dual ridings such as Queens have inherent disadvantages, Mr. MacLean said. They require a large number of petitions to the Dominion Elections Act and create confusion in the minds of voters. This is particularly true, the Queens member said, when three parties have candidates at an election.

"This week's decision by the Supreme Court of Canada which has upheld the appeal by the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board, from the decision of the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island on the most important questions in the reference, is being received with gratification by agricultural producers throughout Canada," states Mr. D. A. Macdonald, chairman of the P. E. I. Potato Marketing Board. "The decision confirms the legality of the Dominion Agricultural Products Marketing Act, the Dominion Order-in-Council delegating certain powers to the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board, and the Potato Marketing Scheme as enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council, with the exception of Section 19 which has never been used by the Board and is unnecessary as far as its future operations are concerned."

"While it is difficult to fully appreciate the decision until such time as the full text of the judgments is received, information available would seem to indicate that the efforts of organized agriculture throughout Canada for the past 20 years to obtain workable marketing legislation, have not been in vain and it is now evident that the tried legal minds who drafted Bill 82 of the Parliament of Canada, 1949, and the Dominion Department of Justice who approved it, as well as the elected representatives of the Canadian people who enacted the statute, knew what they were doing."

FRIDAY

OTTAWA, July 3 — (Special) — Plans for the Federal building at Kensington are practically complete. It was learned today from the Watson MacNaught, Liberal member for Prince and Parliamentary assistant to Fisheries Minister Mayhew.

The plans for the structure would have been ready earlier except for a familiar situation, which arises when staffs of more than one Federal Department occupy a building. Each department sub-chief habitually jockey for position and fights for the best location in the common building as well as the largest amount of floor-space. Hence completed or partially completed plans must be passed around from one department to the other for information and suggestion.

It is regarded as a mark of prestige for the Minister and the Department if it can secure the choicest spot in a new building. The Kensington Federal Building will furnish accommodation for the Post Office, the Department of Agriculture, and the R.C.M.P. Tenders for the new structure at Kensington will be called this autumn and Mr. MacNaught is hopeful that at least a beginning can be made on the work this year.

Allan James MacCormack, age 41, was fatally injured yesterday

morning when the car which he was driving left the road near St. Margaret's and plunged into the ditch. Mr. A. J. Gallant and Mary Feehan, St. Margaret's, other occupants of the car, were taken to the Souris Hospital, Mr. Gallant suffered from a broken arm, and Miss Feehan from shock.

The three were returning from attending a wedding celebration at St. Charles when the car left the road, plunged into the ditch, and wrecking the vehicle.

The Souris detachment R. C. M. P. was immediately notified, and Dr. M. N. Beck, St. Peter's, coroner, impounded a jury.

The deceased is survived by his mother, Mrs. Archie MacCormack, aged 82. He was unmarried and an only child. His father was killed several years ago in a fall from a load of hay while working on his farm.

At a meeting of the City Council held yesterday morning, presided over by Acting Mayor Elmer MacDonald, the Finance Committee was authorized to issue refunding debentures to the amount of sixty-eight thousand dollars, dated July 3rd. The debentures are to be for a term of twenty years, and to bear interest at the rate of four and one-half per cent per annum, payable half yearly, in denominations of one hundred dollars or in any larger amount.

City debentures to the total amount of \$136,000 have all been retired, and the Council has authorized to issue refunding debentures to the amount of one-half of the debentures so retired.

A seven-year old boy, son of Mr. Ted Moynagh of the Island Motor Transport, had a narrow escape from drowning off the fertilizer wharf yesterday afternoon. He was playing with a group of his own age when he tumbled into the deep water.

Fortunately at the time the Naval harbor craft used in training by H. M. C. S. Queen Charlotte was just pulling away from Bruce Stewart's Wharf where she had been for repairs. On board were B. Donald Graham and L.S. Windmason. AB. Crandall saw the boy going down and immediately went into the water after him. He was followed at once by J.S. Judson. Both naval men were fully clothed.

Once again the skirl of the pipes was heard as the Lads and Lassies Pipe Band saluted the official opening of the City Playgrounds on King Square last night. The universal appeal of the pipes drew a large crowd to pack the area and the surrounding streets were jammed with cars as hundreds more listened on the loudspeakers.

A plea to all youngsters to observe the commonsense rules of safety was made by Chief of Police Charles MacArthur. He exhorted them to avoid accidents and to pay attention to the teachings of their supervisors on the playgrounds provided for them.

The playgrounds were officially opened on King Square on behalf of all the others in the city. Acting Mayor Elmer MacDonald declared them open and offered personal congratulations to the Playground Commission for a splendid job.

At an inquest at Hampton last evening, a coroner's jury found that Ellsworth Ferguson of Craapaud came to his death on June 25 at approximately 12:20 a.m. on the highway between Desable and Hampton when struck by a truck driven by Gordon Carr of Tryon.

The inquest was presided over by Coroner Dr. L. E. Prowse of Charlottetown and Mr. John P. Nicholson represented the crown. Evidence from nine witnesses was heard.
