Notes of the Week.

It is announced that a scheme for the Federal Union of Australia will be submitted to its several Legislatures.

Having endured the horrors of war, Egypt is now enduring the horrors of cholera. Hundreds are dying daily; the air is full of the plague; and precautions are being taken to prevent it from spreading to Europe.

Principal Grant thinks that a union of, not the Methodists only, but of several other distinctively Protestant bodies is likely to take place.

The French have seized the port and custom house of Tamatav, Madagascar, they threaten Tonquin and the Celestial Empire, and they occupy the New Hebrides.

There has lately been a test election in Manitoba. Five months ago, Mr. Burnham, an Opposition candidate, was elected by a majority of ten; and, on Saturday last, Mr. Chalmers, the Government candidate, defeated Mr. Burnham by a majority of seventy-six.

The Government of New Brunswick, having taken THE EXAMINER'S advice and reorganized the management of the Dominion and Centennial Exhibition, the leading men of St. John are energetically forwarding the work of preparation.

The Globe contends that by going to England to represent the Government of which he is a member, Sir Charles Tupper has violated the Independence of Parliament and forfeited his seat in the House of Commons.

The season when poor unfortunate townspeople, compelled to stick to business, like to take advantage of an occasional opportunity to get away into the country for a few hours, has arrived.

The votes of this week decide that Methodist Union shall take place. The denominations to be united are the Methodist Church of Canada, representing a population of 582,063; the Methodist Episcopal, representing 103,272; the Bible Christians, 27,236, and the Primitive Methodists, 25,680.

And the laity of the Methodist Church of Canada have adopted the Basis on a vote of 7,084 against 1,425. The other parties to the proposed contract have also, so far as heard from, cast a majority of votes in favor of the Union.
