#### HORRIBLE OCCURRENCE.

Seventy-Five Men and Boys Fall in a Glass Vat—Nine Die.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 30.—Nine persons were killed and forty badly injured by the collapse of the roof of the Pacific Glass Works, while it was crowded with men and boys watching a football game in the field adjoining.

About twenty-five people fell through the roof upon the hot furnaces of the glass vat below. All were horribly burned and it is feared that in addition to the nine deaths already reported, there will be several more.

#### GARRISON CAPTURED.

General Knox Pursues DeWet.

LONDON, Nov. 30.—Lord Roberts telegraphs that DeWet's raiders have captured the Dewetsdorp garrison. The losses were fifteen killed and forty two wounded.

The enemy is said to be 2,500 strong.

#### THE RECOUNT IN EAST QUEEN'S.

The recount of the ballots cast in East Queen's at the late election commenced before Judge McDonald in his Chamber this morning. At the hour of adjournment for dinner eight polls had been examined and a number of votes reserved for argument and decision. The missing statement for Covehead poll was found in the large envelope. Two ballots for Martin were without the initials of the deputy returning officers' although bearing the Government stamp, and a number of ballots were marked with an X instead of a simple X. These were evidently marked by readers of the Patriot. The recount is in progress and will likely continue for some days.

#### SUPREME COURT.

The Court met this morning to give judgment in the case of Landrigan vs. Lank. This was an application by Landrigan claiming goods under distress for an order to the sheriff, who seised under a fi fa issue at the instance of Lank, a judgment creditor, to pay the amount of the distress to the plaintiff. Written judgments were delivered. The Chief Justice and Judge Fitzgerald ruled in favor of the application, and Judge Hodgson dissented. S. Blanchard and A. Peters for the applicant; Mr Stewart for the defendant.
