A LESSON FROM MEXICO.

Destruction of the Forests Has Brought Drought and Desolation.

The early conquerors of this country and their followers of today have been very wasteful and careless in the disposition of their forests, with the result of accelerating the date when they will be compelled to face a problem of forest preservation at considerable cost to themselves. Denizens of the northwest are familiar with the rapidity with which the valuable timber areas have been denuded, until now there is scarcely a merchantable tree between Arkansas and the Canadian line. Many notes of warnings accompanied this destruction of the northern soft wood forests, but they fell upon unwilling ears. Only after it was too late to stop the mischief did the country begin to recognize the indirect value of forests to agriculture and that no high degree of civilization can exist permanently without some systematic and adequate forest management. In India the destruction of the forests commenced 1,000 years ago, and that country, having at last seen the folly of such waste, is now engaged in the expensive undertaking of reforesting large areas.

The effect upon rainfall and the productivity of the cultivated tracts has already been acknowledged by investigators. When Cortes first saw the valley of Mexico, it was covered with woods, not dense, but abundant, from the timber line on the volcanoes down to the water's edge. The reckless cutting down of the forests by the Spaniards in the first century following the conquest in 1521 increased evaporation, caused the lakes to dry up, led to frequent droughts, followed by occasional floods, and changed the climate of Anahuac.

Any old rancher will tell stories of streams that flowed when he was a boy and will show the dry arroyo now. They all claim that the tablelands had timber in considerable quantities where now there are barren deserts.

This government has taken some steps in the matter, but it is also necessary for the landowners to assist in this work by planting trees and irrigating them for a few years until they have taken good root. By using good judgment in selecting the trees and in planting in a few years the complaints which are now so frequent of years of droughts will soon become fewer and fewer until they finally cease.—Monterey Globe.

MEETING OF PRESBYTERY

WEDNESDAY, Aug. 3.

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met yesterday, August 2nd, in St. James' Hall, Charlottetown, and was constituted: Mr. John Gillis, Moderator pro tempore, with whom were present Messrs. A. McL. Sinclair, Adam Gunn, A. S. Stewart, Malcolm Campbell, D. B. McLeod, W. H. Spencer, R. McLean, J. W. McKenzie, T. F. Fullerton, J. M. Fisher, George Millar, A. Craise, G. C. Robertson, J. Layton, Ministers; and Messrs. J. J. McLeod, Joseph Robertson, C. McKinnon, D. McRae, and Hon. D. Laird, Elders.

Minutes of meetings held on May 10th and 31st and June 1st were read and sustained.

Rev. Dr. Pollok and Mr. Reid who were present, were invited to sit and correspond.

Mr. A. S. Stewart was elected Moderator for the ensuing six months, and Mr. T. F. Fullerton was re-elected clerk for the ensuing year.

Commissions in behalf of the following addresses were received, and their names were placed on the roll: Messrs James Clow, Alex. Martin, D. McRae, M. D. McLeod, James McLeod, N. N. McLeod, C. McKinnon, Wm. G. Taylor, Arch. Ramsay, Jos. Robertson, Henry McLeod and the Hon. B. Rogers.

The following was ordered to be inserted in the minutes:—

In removing from the roll of this Presbytery the name of the late Rev. David Sutherland, whose unexpected demise has produced such widespread regret, we, with entire submission to the Divine will, desire to give expression to our own poignant sorrow under the sad bereavement that has come upon us, and at the same time to place on record our deep sense of the high personal and ministerial attainments and character of our departed brother, and of the great loss sustained by us.

Mr. Sutherland was born in Caithnessshire, in the north of Scotland, in the year 1859; prosecuted his studies for the holy ministry in the University of Edinburgh and in the Presbyterian College, Halifax. He was thereafter for a short period minister of Richmond, Halifax, and in 1889 was inducted into Zion Church, Charlottetown, where, during his ministry of eight years, he had endeared himself to his flock by his earnest and practical preaching and by his assiduous and faithful work in the congregation.

As a Presbytery we shall miss him because his seat, so regularly filled, will be empty. His genial manner, his wise counsel, his growing experience did so much to aid us in our work.

We would also with sincere sorrow take this opportunity to place on record our sincere sympathy with the bereaved widow and family, and with the aged parents in distant Scotland, commending them affectionately to the race and consolation of their Heavenly Father; and with the congregation of Zion Church that has thus been deprived of pastor, guide and friend.

The clerk was instructed to send extracts of this minute to the widow, the parents, and the session of Zion Church. Rev. T. F. Fullerton was appointed interim moderator of Zion Church session, and the pulpit was ordered to be declared vacant on Sabbath, the 7th inst.

Messrs John Gillis and M. Campbell were appointed a committee to examine the session records of Orwell, and on their report they were attested by the Moderator.

The Rev. Principal Pollok then made a statement in regard to the new library building, and the following resolution was unanimously carried:—

The Presbytery having heard with much pleasure Dr. Pollok's statement regarding the College library building, resolves as follows:—

First, that in the judgment of the Presbytery, it is not only desirable but greatly necessary that the building should be erected;

Secondly, that the Presbytery strongly recommends our congregations, especially the wealthier members of them, to contribute liberally towards the erection of the new building.
