Jury Attributes Fatalities To Multiple Body Injuries

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN — A coroner's jury last evening unanimously agreed that Lemuel Edward Newson, 27, and Anita Blanchard, 16, met their death as a result of multiple body injuries received in a two-car collision on May 22 at about 1 a.m. approximately three miles east of the village of Freetown.

The inquest into the death of the two Summerside residents held in the Supreme Court chambers here, was presided over by Dr. L.E. Prowse, chief coroner for the province.

The two deceased were the only occupants of a 1963 Ford which was involved in a collision with a 1963 Buick driven by Edison Champion. Both Mr. Champion and a passenger in his car, Athol Buell, both of Summerside, suffered injuries in the collision.

The pathologist who performed the autopsies on the two de-

ceased, Dr. John Craig, Charlottetown, was the first of eleven witnesses to give testimony.

MAIN INJURIES

In his report Dr. Craig stated that the main injuries to Mr. Newson were: A compression injury of the chest which resulted in a rupture of the heart, resulting in extensive hemorrhaging into the chest cavity; many other injuries including lacerations of the liver, slight brain damage and a broken arm.

The blood-alcohol content of the deceased was 2.3 milligrams per millilitre, Dr. Craig stated.

Miss Blanchard had severe internal injuries, particularly to the diaphragm — a sheet of muscle between the abdominal cavity and the chest cavity — which was ruptured. She also had a broken neck.

Dr. Craig thought death had been instantaneous. Asked if he thought seat belts might have prevented these deaths, he answered that they might have, and again, might not.

Dr. J.K. Bell, testified that Mr. Buell had suffered a fractured right arm and shoulder and the facial bones on the right side had been considerably pulverized. It is understood that the injured man recently underwent surgery in Halifax.

Mr. Champion suffered facial lacerations, fractured jaw, fractured facial bones and nose as well as fractures in the chest area.

Asked if there was any evidence of alcohol on the injured men, Dr. Beer stated he didn't think so — at least he couldn't smell any.

Mr. Champion, who just recently was released from the hospital, stated that at the time of the accident he and Mr. Buell were returning from Charlottetown where they had provided the music for an Alcoholics Anonymous anniversary party.

QUITE CERTAIN

He said that all of a sudden he came upon a car some 75 feet

away sideways on the highway. He was quite certain the vehicle was in motion. He stated that he hadn't seen any lights prior to seeing the vehicle. He said that Mr. Buell was asleep at the time and he remembered telling him something to the effect that he had better get down because there was going to be a collision. He didn't think Mr. Buell had heard him.

One of the first persons on the scene, Donald Spurgeon Reeves, Summerside R.R. 3, stated that when he arrived at the scene moments after the collision both deceased were outside of the car on the pavement.

He said he felt the pulses of both deceased and could find none. He and a passenger in his vehicle, Wylie Baglole, Freetown, subsequently moved the bodies to the south side of the highway away from the vehicles as the Newson car had caught fire.

Asked if he might have an idea who might have been driving the death car, he answered that the way the vehicle was smashed and the position of the bodies, he would have to say it would be impossible to determine who was driving.

ALCOHOL

Asked if there was any evidence of alcohol in the Newson vehicle he said there was and when queried about alcohol in the Champion vehicle he said there had been none.

Mr. Reeves said that shortly before the accident the Champion vehicle had overtaken and passed his car on the Freetown Road and he estimated at the time that the Champion vehicle was travelling at a speed slightly over 40 miles per hour.

Both Mr. Reeves and his passenger, Mr. Baglole of Freetown, stated that when they went to the Champion vehicle both occupants had been partially conscious and asking to be removed from the car. They stated that they had ta-

ked Mr. Buell out and made him as comfortable as possible on the ground but had not moved Mr. Champion because he appeared injured more seriously than Mr. Buell.

Gary Allen Toole of Breadalbane stated that just before the accident they had met the Champion vehicle as they were proceeding east along the Freetown Road and it had not travelled much more than 1 1/2 lengths past their car when the collision occurred.

A passenger in the Toole vehicle David Lee Kennedy, Breadalbane, said he had looked back before the accident and had seen no lights or vehicle approaching from the rear.

From all evidence at the scene he was of the opinion that both vehicles were in motion when the collision occurred. When asked, he felt the vehicles came together at considerable speed.

and now at Montague, who assisted in the investigation, produced photos he had taken at the scene as well as a scale drawing he had prepared of the area.
