# Ice Conditions Said Improving

Fog hampered an aerial ice survey yesterday. Eugene Gorman, deputy minister of fisheries, said last night. With John O'Connor, secretary of the Fishermen's Loan Board, he attempted a survey about a Maritime Canal Airways plane. Pilot was Robert Graham.

Mr. Gorman said the western end of Northumberland Strait had only an odd patch of ice. However, there was still some ice in Hillsboro Bay. It was not possible to continue observations much beyond Point Prim because of fog.

Off the east coast there was considerable open water inshore from Murray Harbor to about Souris and from there towards East Point there was loose ice but here again observations were very limited by fog.

On the north shore from 10 miles east of Summerside to 12 miles open water inshore, and further east, off North Lake, some eight miles.

Another flight is planned this morning, when it expected visibility will be improved.

# Premier Defends ARDA Program

By DON MACLEOD, Guardian Staff Writer. Government ministers were annoyed with the suggestion that the Agricultural Rehabilitation and Development program in this province appears to be relegating agriculture to a minor position.

Elaborating further on the provincial program, Premier Shaw said "at present, the program calls for an intensive investigation from Summerside to the end of Prince County in order to determine what is chiefly an agricultural area, involving a study of agricultural resources, as well as needs of fisheries and natural resources and other things closely associated with the rural economy."

"The whole program is within the limits of ARDA and outside the limits of ARDA concerned with the economic and social uplift of farmers, fishermen and other citizens in the rural parts of the province."

Premier Walter R. Shaw said there is obvious need for a very serious lack of understanding on the part of those taking a stand on the whole resource development program being undertaken in this province.

"The ARDA program is exceedingly broad, and is developed under the title of 'resources' in this province involves a complete rural development program. It must be quite obvious that in an agricultural country, the chief objective of such a program is to be intrinsically associated with our farm people."

# TB Cases Up 10% League Informed

"Tuberculosis cases in Canada are up 10 per cent over last year according to the latest official statistics," stated Dr. W. L. Jones at the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Tuberculosis League held at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday afternoon.

Dr. Jones, executive secretary of the Canadian Tuberculosis Association in Ottawa, said that "the greatest danger is in the fact that many people are becoming complacent with the slackening of the fight against the disease."

"There is still about 20 per cent of the people in this country who do not even make use of the services and surveys provided by the association and it is these people who are largely responsible for the increase in occurrence of the disease," he said.

He noted that tuberculosis is presenting an even newer problem in that, an increase in the incidence of drug resistant tubercle bacilli is becoming apparent. "There also has not been a new first line drug for TB in the last 15 years," Dr. Jones said.

In his address to the delegates, he expressed the hope that they would accept the challenge of the difficult task which lies ahead of them.

Dr. E. M. Found, superintendent of the Provincial Sanatorium, also addressed the meeting. "The only difference in the treatment of the TB patient today is that he remains in hospital only about one-half the time he did in the pre-drug era," he said.

He added that "out of the 134 patients being treated for the disease on the Island, only 85 are under treatment in the sanatorium."

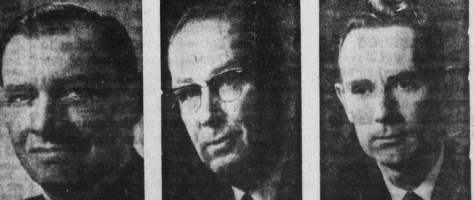
