Ferry Service Is Urged For Georgetown-Cape George

A resolution asking that the federal government give serious consideration to establishing a ferry service between Georgetown and Cape George, N.S., was given unanimous approval in the Legislature Saturday.
The resolution was moved by Arthur MacDonald (Liberal King) and seconded by George Ferguson (Liberal King).
A copy of the resolution is to be forwarded to the federal ministers of transport and public works, the Island members of the House of Commons and the premier of the province.
It was pointed out in the resolution that the Cape Breton causeway and new ferry service, in view of the fact that the ferries were not built to handle heavy freight traffic, is inadequate to serve the new field opened up by the Cape Breton causeway and the Newfoundland service.

Elderly Watchman Killed By Montreal Bomb Blast

MONTREAL (CP)—An elderly night watchman at a Canadian Army recruiting office was killed in a bomb blast Saturday night shortly after the Quebec Liberation Front proclaimed that its violent struggle against Anglo-Saxon colonialism was continuing.
William Victor O'Neill, 63, due to go on pension in 12 months, died when the bomb exploded in a wooden refuse box at the rear of the recruiting office, which was situated on McGill University Street.
MR. O'NEILL's wife survived. It is believed the couple had no children.
MR. O'NEILL was killed by the brick recruiting office, which faces the entrance to McGill University. The force of the explosion threw his body through a window behind the building and shattered second- and third-story windows in surrounding buildings.
HAD JUST REPORTED
Army sources said the watchman, who had just come on duty, had been inside the building and walked out the door shortly before the blast.
There was no positive indication as to whether the explosion was activated by a timer or was a booby trap, set to explode in the event of a fire.
Det. Sgt. Leo Plouffe, of the Montreal police bomb expert, said while working at the scene Sunday it appeared that preliminary stage of investigation that it might have been a booby trap. However, he conceded there still was a possibility it had been set off by a timer.
There were reports that one of three suspects had been arrested for or could not be confirmed with local police, the army or the RCMP.
Nothing was found at the scene to link the blast to the Front de Liberation Quebecois, which describes itself as a group of "suicide commandos" who intend to bring down the "systematic sabotage" of all colonial symbols and institutions, including the RCMP and the armed forces.

N.B. Vote Expected In Rain

FREDERICTON (CP)—New Brunswick voters chose between Liberals and Progressive Conservatives today after a late-starting campaign that kept going to the eve of the provincial general election.
About 300,000 persons were eligible to vote. The weather was not a factor for showers, all day in northern parts of the province, clearing in the afternoon on southern and eastern sections.
Last time New Brunswickers voted two weeks ago today in the federal election, a blizzard pounded the Maritimes.
Polls open at 9 a.m. AST and close at 6 p.m.
Premier Louis J. Robichaud, whose Liberals ousted the Progressive Conservative government in the June 27, 1960 election, and PC leader C.P. (Clyde) Sheppard campaigned during the weekend and a number of political meetings were scheduled Sunday night.
In the 1960 election 238,868 of the 295,232 eligible voters—77 per cent—cast ballots and elected 31 Liberals and 21 PCs. In the 1955 election 37 PCs and 15 Liberals were elected.
Mr. Robichaud predicted the Liberals would win 42 seats and Mr. Sheppard predicted the PCs would win 32.

PC Cabinet Pays Call On Gov.-Gen.

OTTAWA (CP)—Twelve of the retiring Conservative cabinet ministers paid a final courtesy call on alling Governor-General Vanier Sunday on the eve of the government changeover.
Into Gen. Vanier's bedroom with them went the great seal of Canada, locked in a black leather case. Today he will hand it over to whatever minister is sworn in as secretary of state in the new Liberal government. Secretary of State Halpenny had been the custodian of the seal.
