

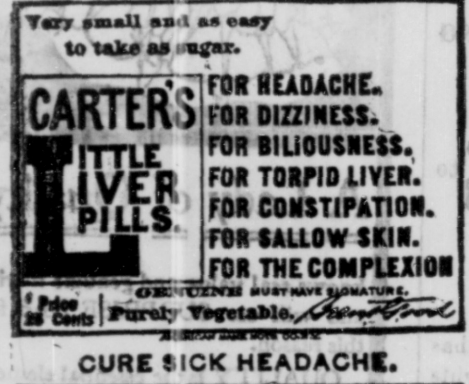

THE SECOND POINT.

Why was the election in the Second District of Queen's put off until after the recent session of the Legislature? This is a question that ought to be addressed to Premier Farquharson at every public meeting held throughout the campaign that is now on. Why leave the people of West River, Rustico, Milton, North River, etc., unrepresented in the Legislature and hold an election to fill the vacancy as soon as possible after the Legislature was prorogued? Mr. Wise's resignation ought—according to the law and according to the promise of Premier Farquharson, as well as in justice to the electors of the second district, to have been acted upon in March last. If acted upon at that time the Second District of Queen's would not have gone unrepresented in the Legislative Assembly. But then, Pineau would not have held the balance of power and the Farquharson Government would not now be in office!

THE LIQUOR RESTRICTIONS.

The restrictions in the Liquor Regulation Act were evaded by the Farquharson Government by repealing them. But the Guardian has no word of condemnation against the Government for so doing. It does, however, condemn the EXAMINER for objecting to the repeal. It is noted that the Guardian, whilst condoning and apologising for the many faults of the Liberals, does so in a very bare-faced manner, and always imputes improper motives to its Conservative opponents. The Guardian is able to swallow Farquharson's concessions, but appears to be too weak to swallow the emergency food scandal now being ventilated at Ottawa. In a day or two it may become stronger, and the public may then expect to see the Guardian blaming the Hon. Mr. Monk and the Conservatives for exposing the scandalous fraud in the House of Commons, and thereby doing injury to the party of purity.

METHODIST CONFERENCE

At Monday's session of the conference at Moncton the report of the committee on Sabbath observance was submitted and adopted without discussion. It urges the better observance of the day's suggests that each minister be requested to preach some time during the confessional year at least one sermon on the subject of Sabbath observance.

The secretary-treasurer of the St. James' Church relief fund reported that the conference had contributed \$1900 to the fund. The report of the committee on the state of church work expressed pleasure with the response to the appeal for funds; also the spiritual progress shown in the Epworth League, the flourishing Sunday schools and attendance on public worship; but regretted the small decrease in church membership. The committee discontinued the use of sensational methods to secure revivals. Some objection was taken to the latter statement, and also to an intimation in the report that there was some neglect in baptising invalids and children. The report was referred back to committee for amendment.

The report of the Union Church relief fund showed \$103 39 as receipts, of which the Charlottetown district contributed \$16.77 and the Summerside district \$8.48. The report of the temperance committee was again discussed, along the same lines as Saturday, as to whether it was best to accept provincial prohibition or continue to press for the larger measure for the whole Dominion.

Ex Mayor Dawson, of Charlottetown, said he was compelled to vote against the resolution congratulating P. E. Island upon the prohibitory measure passed by the government of that Island. It had some good features, but on the whole the law was not such as to meet the views of the prohibitionists.

Dr. Allison moved in amendment to the clause under discussion, that the conference will await with great interest the practical outcome of the prohibitory legislation recently adopted by the Legislature of P. E. Island, and expressed the hope that the legislation will be found to be effective and salutary in the scope of its operation. The amendment was also carried unanimously.

The clause endorsing the action of the Dominion Temperance Alliance was struck out unanimously.

The effect of the action taken by the Conference with reference to the temperance question is to adhere to the resolution passed last year in favor of prohibition for the whole Dominion.

At Tuesday's session of the conference Rev. W. W. Brewer was allowed a year's rest, and instead of becoming a supernumerary and receiving supernumerary funds he was recommended to the contingent fund for a sum equal to the claims of a supernumerary.

The Epworth League report was submitted. It showed a total of sixteen Leagues, with 384 members. The number of Epworth Leagues of C. E. was 37;

active members, 865; associate, 541. The contributions for the year were \$1420.31. The final draft of the station sheet was presented. Charlottetown and Summerside districts are as follows:

R v. Rich-n Opie was appointed Chairman of the Charlottetown District, and Rev. F. Dawson of the Summerside District.

The Sunday School report showed that, Charlottetown district had 31 schools with 1974 scholars and the Summerside District had 32 schools with 1781 scholars. Charlottetown District contributed for missions \$457.02, and for schools \$609.22. Summerside District contributed \$619 for missions and \$433.47 for schools.

Mr. W. B. Dawson was elected to a committee to confer with the Nova Scotia Conference in regard to supernumerary matters.

The supernumerary fund report was read. To this fund Charlottetown district contributed \$194.50, and Summerside district \$159.00.

The sustentation fund was reported decreased for the first time in its history. The total this year was \$2,232.

The conference meets at Marysville next year on the third Thursday in June.

A GOOD BIT OF WORK.

Sir,—In travelling through the country one cannot help noticing any improvements that may be made from time to time, either about the farms, the buildings, the road fences, or the road itself. Very noticeable in the latter is the straightening of a piece of road near Lake Verd, lot 48. This has not only been a very bad piece of road, but an eye-sore for years. Owing, however, to the persistent efforts and the keep-to-itiveness of Charles Myers, Esq., Lake Verd, the powers that be were convinced of the necessity of straightening this curve, and induced to have the work sold at public auction last fall, the road to be completed by July, 1900. The bid fell to Mr. Myers's son James, for \$109 00. We should judge the new road to be fifteen chains long. It had to be brushed from one to three feet deep, sixteen feet wide, and covered with clay one foot deep. Owing to a large flow of water there had to be a bridge put in. This could not be built for much less than \$25.00. Although Mr. Myers only received this paltry amount for such a gigantic piece of work he has completed it in a manner highly creditable to himself. It will be a lasting monument to his ability and settled determination to do the right, no matter at what cost. Men who have seen the work and are competent to judge say that taking the amount of time, labour and material into consideration the road could not be put in its present shape for less than \$150 or \$200. We hope the Government will pay Mr. Myers an honest price for an honest piece of work.
