The Grit Convention.

The gentlemen who left here to-day to take part in the grit convention at Ottawa, will, we have no doubt, enjoy a merry holiday trip. It goes without saying that the Minister of Railways and his officials will facilitate in every way they can—consistently with justice to the country—the pleasure of the occasion. After they have arrived at Ottawa, our delegates will certainly discover that they can agree with the grit aggregation in respect to one point: they will all agree that the Tories ought to be out and that the grits ought to be in. But it will be interesting to watch the development of other points of agreement. How, for instance, the Separate School views of Mr. Laurier and the secular school views of Mr. Davies will be reconciled in respect to the burning question of the Manitoba Act. A miracle must be worked in this regard! Then, the latest turn in the shifting scene of grit policy regarding the tariff and reciprocity with the States will be eagerly scanned. Will the aggregation dare, as recently intimated by Mr. Davies, attempt the theft of the Government's policy as to reciprocity? According to Mr. Davies, the Liberal party is now ready to espouse a policy of "reciprocity in all natural products, and such a fair list of manufactured goods as may be agreed upon after consultation between representatives of both countries." This is, as everyone knows, precisely the policy in respect to reciprocity that has all along been pursued by the Canadian Government. While the Grits were shouting "Unrestricted Reciprocity," the Republican Government, in response to our overtures, declared that it would be satisfied with nothing less than a "reciprocity convention which would be exclusive in its application to the United States and Canada." That is to say, the United States Government refused to party to a treaty of reciprocity which would not discriminate to the exclusion of British goods from the Canadian market. It has not yet appeared that the United States Government and Congress is ready to recede from this position. "Unrestricted Reciprocity" being discredited and impossible, it remains to be seen whether or not the Liberal Party, in convention, will follow the advice of Mr. Davies and steal the Government's policy in respect to reciprocity, and whether or not it is so unnatural and so base as to stab the Mother Country by accepting the "exclusive" proposition of the United States Government, which the Thompson administration promptly and unequivocally rejected.

There are other points of disagreement in respect to which the grit party must be reconciled—other questions concerning which it will be necessary for the convention to agree before the Opposition can hope to win the confidence of a majority of the intelligent electors of Canada. The labor of the convention and its results, will, therefore, be interesting.

Princess May's Trousseau.

BRITISH goods are good enough for the Princess May! In directing that her trousseau shall be made of materials of the product of British hands, she has set a good example. Why should the Canadian go out of Canada for that which he or she needs to put on? One of the most praiseworthy characteristics of the American south of the line is his loyalty to his own country and his own town. He will not send far away for that which he can obtain as cheaply and almost, if not quite, as good at his own door. And why do Americans north of the line buy in England and the States goods such as are produced in Canadian factories? Princess May has, without doubt, displayed good tact and done the right thing. We are told that orders in connection with her trousseau "have been placed with nearly all the larger houses in various parts of the country so as to please as wide a section as possible. From the silk works at Spitalfields comes the dinner dress, the color-ground of which is fleur de peche. The damask is composed of rosebuds, jasmine and maidenhair, each bouquet connected with a silver metal tie. From Spitalfields comes also the material for an evening costume of pale blue and gold. The work of the Manchester makers commands admiration for a simple home dinner dress. The color selected is pale green, ornamented with spots, stripes and daisies. A charming morning robe, composed of thin summer silk, bears testimony to the high standard of the Lusk industry in printed silks. The ground of this dress is myrtle green, with violets adorning the design, which is of perfect workmanship. The going-away dress is to be of Irish poplin of a particularly pretty shade of ivory white, with relief of gold." The British people, with all their wealth, appreciate attentions such as these, and like to have the duty of British men and women to buy British goods exemplified in this way. We feel sure that the manufacturers of Charlottetown, too, would like to be treated by each citizen of Charlottetown, and all the people of the Province, in the same spirit in which Princess May is treating the manufacturers of Great Britain. There are not many factories

here, and we ought to encourage and strengthen those that are here as much as we can. Factories giving employment to men and women and circulating money is what Charlottetown wants more than anything else. Let us take care of those that we have, and we shall stand a better chance to see the number increased.

We understand that the contract for the ferry steamer has been let at last, and that it goes, as we said it would, to Mount Stewart. Mr. Angus M. Donald, of Piquette, who is in partnership in this matter with Sol Clarke, of Mount Stewart, is the contractor at a very much higher figure than the lowest tender.

The General Assembly.

BRUN FORD, June 17. A large amount of business was transacted yesterday by the Presbyterian Assembly. In the evening a crowded church listened attentively to the proceedings of one of the most interesting mission meetings ever held in Canada. The figures for the last year were very encouraging. The total amount raised was \$129,000, of which amount the ladies raised nearly \$40,000.

Turned on the Gas.

MONTREAL, June 17. Mrs. Barre, aged 70, mother of J. L. Barre, wine merchant, was found dead in bed, having been suffocated by gas. She had blown out the light upon retiring.

Lieutenant Governor Chapleau.

QUEBEC, June 17. Lieutenant-Governor Chapleau has obtained an extension of time, and will remain in Paris until September. His Honor's health is not improving as rapidly as his friends would wish.

McGill University.

MONTREAL, June 17. There seems no chance of a Principal for McGill being appointed until the fall, as Sir Donald Smith, A. C. Galt, and Peter Redpath, of the board of governors, will be absent until August or September.

Ascot Races.

LONDON, June 17. The Ascot Heath race meeting has closed. The Warwick stakes of 2000 sovereigns was won by Watercross. The Workingham stakes for 3-year-olds and upwards was won by Pitcher.

The Borden Case.

NEW BRIFORD, June 17. The evidence in the Borden murder case is now all in, and the court has adjourned until Monday to give the counsel time to prepare their closing arguments.

Scott Act Victory.

KNOWLTON, June 17. The voting on the repeal of the Scott Act in Birone County, yesterday, resulted in a decisive victory for the temperance people.

General Telegraphic News.

CHICAGO, June 15.—The number of paid admissions to the World's Fair yesterday was 84,452. Total paid admissions, including June 14, is 2,328,700.

ADRIAN, Mo., June 15.—While six brothers named Wright were standing under a tree near their home yesterday, four were killed by lightning, and two others injured, probably fatally.

HAMBURG, June 15.—The Senate, in order to prevent introduction of cholera, has instructed the police to strictly enforce the ordinance prohibiting the entry of Russian emigrants either by land or water.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 15.—The church of the Chudoy, a monastery within the walls of the Kremlin, was recently robbed of a vast amount of plate, money and gems, valued at between 2,500,000 and 3,000,000 roubles. To-day all the monks belonging to the monastery were arrested. A search of the cells occupied by the monks revealed that they perpetrated the robbery. This crime is punishable in Russia with the most severe penalties.

BERLIN, June 16.—At two o'clock this morning the returns from 70 districts indicated 36 carried by the parties opposed to the army bill and 15 carried for the parties favoring the bill and 19 in doubt between the government and opposition parties, with chances in the majority of them strongly in favor of the government.
