**WI Resolution Urges Raising Status Of DVC**

A resolution urging upon the government the necessity of immediately raising the grade of Walter DVC to the status of a degree granting university was among those passed by the last session of the 49th annual convention of Prince Edward Island Women's Institutes today.

Topics from royal warrants to family allowances were included in over 20 resolutions dealt with by the convention, held during the afternoon by Mrs. Lincoln Dewar, provincial president.

Failures in high school due to lack of incentive, and unemployment among young people were the reasons given in the preamble of a resolution passed that the convention urge the provincial government to employ vocational guidance counsellors.

Discussions led to the combination of two resolutions that be sent to the provincial Drama Association suggesting choral reading workshops for children and the inclusion of choral reading in the drama festival.

"A good school lunch program is promoted as a practical demonstration of good health habits, and hence, is largely educational in nature," she said.

**FAMILY ALLOWANCES**  
 Taking into consideration the rising cost of education and the number of people taking advantage of educational opportunities, it was resolved that the federal government be asked to extend the payment of family allowances to 18 years of age.

The importance of continued support of the provincial music and drama associations was emphasized by Mrs. Walter Dixon in the cultural report.

**REPORTS HEARD**  
 The convention heard reports from seven conveners, as well as Miss Thompson's address "Food Makes A Difference".

Information concerning the institute news was given by Mrs. Norman MacMillan in her public report. She recommended that every member be urged to subscribe to the "News" and that the money be paid from branch institute funds.

Support of the Red Cross blood donor service and the 4-H Clubs was reaffirmed and the convention again went on record as approving uniform time for the province.

Mrs. Joseph Rooney presented the health and welfare report, outlining special clinics and programs and welcoming the opening of Sherwood Hospital and day training classes for retarded children.

Two other resolutions referred to nuclear testing in the atmosphere and membership in the "non-nuclear club", the latter suggesting that the Federated Women's Institutes have "peace" as the theme for a study in the near future.

Mrs. Douglas Melish, in her agriculture report, urged the members to give their fullest support to the federation of agriculturists. She hailed 4-H work as a way of fulfilling the WI objective of the development of better and more useful citizens.
