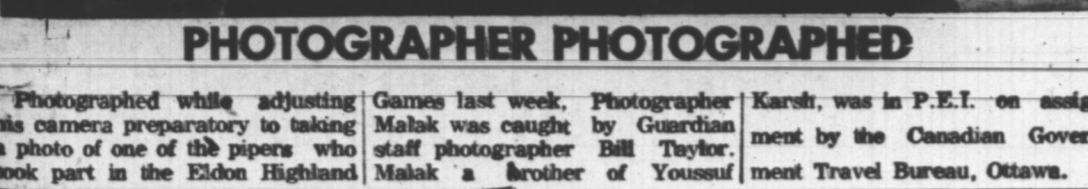

## JUDGES HAVE HUGE TASK

### More Than 2,000 Animals Entered In Cattle Show

At 9:00 this morning judges commence the monumental task of placing the more than 2,000 animals entered in the cattle section of the 1959 provincial exhibition and livestock show.

Complete results are expected to be available by Friday evening, but association manager H. J. Kennedy said last week that it was possible some classes would not be completed before noon Saturday.

Holdsteins with 209 individual entries and Ayrshires with 125 top of the list of breed entries. R. A. Proffit will judge the Holsteins and Alex Sutherland the Ayrshires.

## Vanier Appointment Brings Sigh Of Relief

OTTAWA (CP) — An almost audible sigh of relief went up from some people at the statement accompanying Maj. Gen. George P. Vanier's appointment as Governor-General.

Prime Minister Diefenbaker made it clear he does not consider the naming of a Canadian of French-speaking origin establishes a system of rotation between French- and English-speaking appointees.

He also left the door open—so far as he is concerned—to recommendations for a future Governor-General who is not a Canadian, a man of distinction from Britain or other Commonwealth countries.

These remarks, made to reporters on the steps of Government House in Halifax immediately after the appointment was announced, were comforting to those concerned about the idea of rotating the post of Governor-General between the two largest segments of Canada's patchwork of national extractions.
