## N. H. L. Saturday

**TORONTO (CP)**—Toronto Maple Leafs dropped a 2-1 decision to New York Rangers here Saturday night and will head into the National Hockey League playoffs next week without one of their top defencemen who is through for the season.

Tim Horton, who was named to the second all-star team last season, collided with Ranger defenceman Bill Gadsby and suffered a broken right leg and a broken jaw late in the second period.

The third-place Leafs were leading 1-0 at that point. The Rangers, outplayed by a wide margin over the first two frames, came to life in the third to score two goals against the Toronto club, shaken by Horton's loss.

Lorne Gump Worsley in the New York goal was at his acrobatic best as the Leafs blasted 48 shots at him and counted on only one SLOAN SCORES

That was at 7:31 of the second period when right winger Tom Sloan beat him on Parker MacDonald's short rebound.

The Rangers, in fifth place and out of the playoffs, managed only 19 shots on Harry Lumley in the Leaf net over the 60 minutes.

Defenceman Lou Fontinato made it 1-1 after about three minutes of the third period and winger Pete Conacher counted the winner at 7:45 on a screened shot.

Horton, a 25-year-old native of Cochrane, Ont., was leading a rush against the Ranger blueline when he was injured. He apparently didn't see Gadsby who was moving up with his stick and elbows high. The two collided at full speed and Horton spun around and dropped to the ice with a sickening thud as the crowd of 12,800 gasped.

**CARRIED OFF ICE**  
He lay on the ice motionless and was carried off to the dressing room semi-conscious and then removed to hospital.

Appearing with Rangers for the first time as a full-fledged pro was right-winger Bill McCreary, a graduate of Guelph Biltmore of the Ontario Hockey Association Junior A series who had a three-game tryout earlier this season. The Leafs had a newcomer, too, winger Paul Knox of the University of Toronto team, replacing Eric Nesterenko, who suffered a knee injury when Leafs and Rangers last met Feb. 23.

# Sawchuk Overtakes Lumley To Lead By Three Goals; Wings Trail Habs By Two

**DETROIT (CP)**—Dutch Reibel scored three goals and Marcel Pronovost two as Detroit Red Wings trounced Toronto Maple Leafs, 6-1 Sunday night. It was the seventh straight victory for the Red Wings, moving them to within two points of the Montreal Canadiens in the torrid run for the National Hockey League championship.

With only three games left in the regular season, the Canadiens have 91 points to Detroit's 89. These rivals meet in Montreal Thursday and again in Detroit next Sunday to wind up the season.

Detroit's assault Sunday night moved Red Wing goalie Terry Sawchuk past Toronto netminder Harry Lumley in the race for the Vezina trophy. Lumley, who held a two-goal lead before the game, now trails Sawchuk by three.

Reibel's three goals gave him 21 tallies for the season. Sawchuk lost his shutout with less than three minutes left when George Armstrong drove home a partially screened 12-footer.

However, Sawchuk had the distinction of getting an assist. In the second period, he made a diving stop of Sid Smith's shot and Pronovost picked up the puck and went the full length to score.

It was the second assist in Sawchuk's career.

**BOSTON (AP)**—Maurice Richard, temperamental star of the Montreal Canadiens, nailed linesman Cliff Thompson with a wicked right-hand punch in the third period Sunday night as the Habs bowed 4-2 to Boston Bruins and saw their first-place lead dwindle to two points.

Richard, the National Hockey League's leading scorer, went into the game with a swollen eye and one of his blows caught the official under the eye, raising a large swelling.

Richard went after Laycoe twice with his stick, connecting to the Boston player's head. Laycoe was cut under both eyes. He said one of the cuts came from Richard's stick and another from a punch.

It was the second major outburst of the season by Richard. In Toronto Dec. 29 he threw his gloves at linesman George Hayes and drew a \$250 fine.

Richard hit Thompson twice, his best punch catching the official along the boards near the Boston bench.

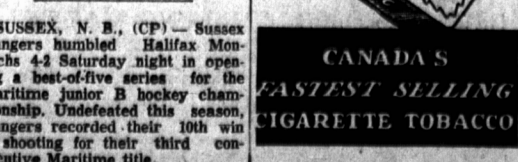
