

Oppose TV Or Radio At Edmonton Bout

EDMONTON (CP) — Managers of Canadian champion Earl Walls and his Argentine conqueror Edgardo Romero, scheduled to meet in a 10-round heavyweight rematch here Oct. 1, have insisted the bout not be televised or broadcast, fight promoter Jack Berry said Tuesday.

Both were said to be an attendance-based percentage option clause in their contracts, which also call for each fighter to get a basic \$1500. Walls was scheduled to arrive from Toronto Tuesday for final workouts while Romero, who scored an upset decision over the Canadian at Vancouver, arrives Sept. 22.
