Considerable Damage Reported From Storm In Various King's Co. Areas

Hurricane Edna left a toll of damage in its wake in Southern Kings early yesterday morning as winds of 70 to 80 m.p.h. uprooted trees and tore off roofs. The increasing winds were noted after 10 p.m. Saturday night and by 11:30 had reached gale force. Shortly after this power lines were broken, and all electricity was cut off, communication lines were also severed. Throughout the night the gale winds lashed the countryside. Small and large trees were broken or uprooted, some falling across the roadways smashing power and communication lines. At Montague ornamental trees suffered great damage. Three lovely old trees at the home of Albert Martin were unrooted, tearing up the sidewalk in their fall. A new car owned by Mr. H. M. Smith was seriously damaged on the hood and front when a tree in front of his home was blown down on the car. Another tree at the opposite corner of the front lawn was also uprooted causing some damage to the house. Throughout the whole town branches littered the streets, ornamental arbors were lifted bodily by the wind and deposited thirty yards away broken almost beyond repair. Wires were found lying across streets, trees, cars and buildings in one of the worst gales to strike the area. At Georgetown, amidst other damage, the roof of James Llewellyn's home was blown off. Part of it was blown across the street, broke off a telephone pole and crashed into the home of Dan-

iel Martell. Another portion of the roof, blown across the street, smashed the front window of Fred Delorey's store. Four telephone poles were lying on the pavement on the Murray River-Murray Harbour road, with several lines being broken and communications disrupted. Electric power was restored to the Montague area early yesterday afternoon after difficult and long hours of labour by the Montague crew. Telephone communications, which again suffered serious damage, particularly along the main highway to Charlottetown, may be out for a few days. Workmen, however, are doing all possible to restore normal conditions as rapidly as possible. At New Perth a barn owned by Mr. Alex Hamilton was reported damaged and at Roseneath an unoccupied barn on the premises of Mr. James MacDonald collapsed.

Particularly with regard to the apple crop which it is feared may be a total failure. The damage to fruit trees is believed general with all orchards suffering heavily. Reports indicate that a majority of the apple crop is on the ground. AT EXPERIMENTAL FARM Mr. R. C. Parent, superintendent of the Experimental Farm, stated over 50 per cent of their crop was down with more of the ripener ones than others. Other fruits suffered similarly. At least a dozen trees were uprooted at the Experimental Farm and some of them were still blocking the main entrance to the Farm late yesterday afternoon. Besides this the roof was ripped off the trench silo and a large quantity of glass broken in the greenhouse. Considerable damage also resulted at the local Golf Club where the front of the verandah was torn off and the tops of two chimneys blown down.

Pour Concrete For Montague Bridge Approach

Transport Trailer Is Overturned

A Transport trailer, the property of Challis & Sons, Maine U.S.A. was seriously damaged Friday night, when after having been left parked on the side of the side of the main road outside Montague, it toppled into the ditch, crushing the side and hood. The trailer was carrying 27,000 lbs. of Irish moss, loaded by Ray Stewart of Murray Harbour, and destined for Bedford, Mass. After leaving Montague only last week, the truck broke down, necessitating leaving the trailer parked. However the right front was parked on a soft shoulder, and after some time the weight of the load forced the wheel farther into the shoulder, until it broke away, toppling the trailer into the ditch. Saturday the load was removed and transferred to another truck for transit. Efforts will be made this week to upright the trailer and remove it to another location.
