## THE REVOLT IN QUEBEC.

**Chapleau's Successor as Lieutenant-Governor,**

**CANDIDATES NOMINATED FOR NICOLET**

**Laurier Reigns at Ottawa While Tarte Runs the Show.**

QUEBEC, Dec. 15.—The latest rumor in connection with the Liberal revolt is that Sir Adolphe Chapleau will leave Spencerwood and be succeeded by Marchand as Lieutenant Governor. Marchand will, in turn be succeeded as Provincial Premier by Robidoux, Provincial Secretary.

BEAUCOURT, Dec. 15.—Joseph Boehene, Conservative, and J. H. Leduc, Liberal, nominated yesterday for the bye-election to fill the vacancy in the House of Commons for Nicolet. Premier Laurier spoke but did not say anything in particular. The fight hangs on the granting of a subsidy to the South Shore railway.

The premier did not promise a subsidy but stated that as both candidates were in favor of the subsidy it seemed to him the best policy for the electors would be to elect a friend of the government.

The opposition speakers twitted the premier considerably concerning the Liberal revolt. Ball, M. P. P., for Nicolet remarked that Laurier reigned at Ottawa, while Tarte ran the show.

## ITEMS FROM OTTAWA.

**The Cabinet Transacts Routine Business.**

**The Dominion Fishing Fleet in Winter Quarters.**

OTTAWA, Dec. 15.—A meeting of the cabinet was held yesterday, but only routine business was transacted as the Premier, Hon. Mr. Fielding and Sir Richard Cartwright are out of town. The Fishery Protection fleet on the Atlantic Coast has gone into winter quarters with the exception of the Osprey which is engaged in watching two or three American fishing schooners.

### Sir Charles Coming.

LONDON, Dec. 15.—Sir Charles Tupper expects to sail for Canada tomorrow. His speech at yesterday's meeting of the new Gold Field Company of British Columbia fills three columns of a financial paper.

## HEAVY FIGHTING REPORTED

**Trouble in Connection With a Transport.**

**British Officers and Men Killed and Wounded.**

SIMLA, Dec. 15.—News of heavy and disastrous fighting has been received. The British lost two officers killed and two wounded, and forty men killed and wounded. The fight occurred in connection with a transport.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

St. John, N. B. December 11.—The steamship Lake Winnipeg reports passed the Galia and Parisian five hours after they left Halifax. The Parisian then being in the lead by a mile. Five hours later still, the Boston City reports having passing both vessels, with the Galia three miles ahead.

St. PETERSBURG.—The Novosti says that the absence of protests from the other powers at Germany's evident determination to remain at Kiau Chau Bay indicates that the petition of China has actually begun and will proceed quickly. Another newspaper expresses the belief that the United States, are among other powers, may object to the permanent occupation of Kiau Chau Bay by Germany. Russian officials circles however, appear indifferent to the steps taken by Germany.

OTTAWA, Dec. 13.—The war office has forwarded a reply to the petition of the city of Toronto concerning the establishment of a recruiting depot at Toronto, in connection with the 100th Regiment service. The letter is as follows: Re the petition of Toronto praying the charge of the 100th or Prince of Wales Royal Canadian Regiment, and that a depot of regulars be established in Toronto. I am directed to inform you that the suggestions have been carefully examined and that the secretary of state for war and the commander in chief are prepared to give favorable consideration to any proposals which might tend to foster a connection between the regular army and the militia forces of Canada and to further cement the strong feeling of sympathy already existing between the mother country and the Dominion. The letter concludes by suggesting that it be found out how far the Canadian government would be prepared to go in the way of establishing depots providing commissariat quarters, etc.
