### Critic Hopes To Find Talent At U.S. Ballet Festival

OTTAWA (CP) — An annual ballet festival that got its start in the United States in 1959 comes to Ottawa this April, and a Canadian woman has been chosen to adjudicate it.

Lauretta Thistle, ballet critic of the Ottawa Citizen for the last 15 years, will preside April 21-26 at the sixth Northeast Regional Ballet Festival of the United States.

It's to be held here at the invitation of the Classical Ballet Concert Group of Ottawa, which has been taking part each year since the festival was inaugurated.

More than 300 dancers are expected to perform in the best ballets of 14 companies. Mrs. Thistle visited them for preliminary adjudication.

Among the 14 are two Canadian groups - the Canadian Junior Ballet Company of Toronto under direction of Dr. Jablokova-Vorps, and the Classical Ballet Concert Group of Toronto directed by Nesta Tounine.

Other groups taking part are from Dayton and Cleveland, Ohio, Erie, Bethlehem and

#### A Berry-Cherry Filling Very Flavorful In Pie

THERE'S never a dull moment in the world of cookery. Today, we come up with a newly discovered method for a frozen homemade fruit pie filling, made with plain - frozen blueberries and the plentiful frozen or canned red sour cherries.

Instead of buying frozen fruit pies ready to bake, use our fruit pie fillings can be home-frozen anytime, ready to bake in your own favorite flaky pastry crust. We will give you recipes for more frozen fruit pie fillings during the year.

Measurements level; recipes for 6

**FROZEN BLUEBERRY-CHERRY PIE**  
3 tbsps quick-cooking tapioca  
1 1/4 c sugar  
4 tps salt  
2 c frozen blueberries, thawed  
2 c frozen red sour cherries, thawed or canned and drained  
1 tbsps lemon juice

Pastry for a 2-crust 9" pie homemade or from a mix  
1 tbsps butter or margarine  
Combine tapioca, sugar, salt, fruits and lemon juice; mix well.

To freeze filling in pie shape Line 8" pie pan with heavy-duty aluminum foil or several thicknesses of transparent Saran, letting lining extend 5" beyond rim of pan. Pour filling into pan.

Loosely cover filling with extending lining. Freeze until firm. Then seal lining, lightly over the filling. Remove wrapping from pan. Return to freezer. Store up to 6 months.

To put the pie together: Roll half pastry less than 1/4" thick. With this, line 9" pie pan and trim pastry 1" beyond edge of rim. Roll remaining pastry 1/4" thick; cut 3 (2") slits or a fancy design near center.

To fill and bake the pie: Remove wrapping from frozen filling and set frozen block of fruit (not thawed) into the pastry-lined pan.

Dot filling with butter. Moistened extended edge of bottom crust with cold water.

Center top crust on filling, and trim, letting pastry extend 1/4" beyond rim. Press top and bottom crusts together on rim; then fold top crust under bottom crust to make a seal. Flute edge. Slightly press open slits in top crust to permit steam-escape during baking.

Bake about 1 hr. at 425 deg.

**BROILED MUSHROOMS FROM THE CHEF**  
1 lb good - sized fresh mushrooms  
1 tbsps salt  
1/2 tps pepper  
6 rounds buttered white bread toast

3 tbsps room - soft butter or margarine  
1 tbsps minced parsley or black olives  
Remove stems from mushrooms and save to cook in any soup.

Place mushrooms on buttered broiling rack. Dust with salt and pepper. Broil about 8 min. 4" from source of heat; 6 min. on one side; 2 min. on the other side.

Arrange mushrooms on buttered toast. Fill mushroom centers with mixture of butter, parsley or black olives. When used as garnish, edge entree with mushrooms on toast.
