#### PROTECT YOUR FUTURE! DEFEND EDUCATION

The students of Canada recognize the need to speak with one voice in asserting our legitimate needs and concerns. Our ultimate goal is a system of post-secondary education which is accessible to all, of high quality, nationally planned, recognizing the legitimacy of student representation and validity of student rights, and whose role in society is appreciated.

The people of Canada require complete and continuous access to the educational programs of our choice in order to exercise our right to education. A high quality and democratic public education is vital to our ability to fully participate in the political, cultural, scientific and artistic life of our rapidly changing society. Canadian governments must adequately fund education and co-ordinate programs with social and economic planning, understanding that the needs of Canadian society reach beyond the immediate needs of industry. During the week of Oct. 12-15, Canadian Students across the country, in collaboration with the Canadian Federation of Students, will engage in campaign work to most effectively bring their messages to the government and to the public. The National Week of Information will address issues that most affect students in their struggle to a post-secondary education.

#### ESTABLISHED PROGRAMS FINANCING (EPF)

The Federal government has indicated that in future the Health and Post-Secondary portions of funding will be split to allow for better accountability. This may allow for cutbacks in funding for post-secondary education in favor of Health. Students feel that there should be no reduction in funding, and that funds should be earmarked specifically for education.

#### NATIONAL SKILLS TRAINING PROGRAM

With this program an emphasis on transferable skills will help cut out general education from vocational education programs. This program

represents the governments general attitude toward education as something to be tailored to fit the needs of the economy on a short-term basis.

#### STUDENT AID

Chartered banks are lobbying the government to increase the interest rate on student loans to prime plus one. Other bank moves in this area include centralization of loan processing and negotiating, and imposition of a 10% ceiling on increases in the total amount of loans processed compared to last year.

#### EMPLOYMENT

The Government of Canada has long promised that 1.5% of the Gross National Product would be devoted to employment research and development. This has yet to come, contributing to the employment problem.

#### STUDENT RIGHTS

Legislation should acknowledge the right of students to organize. The right of any individual, regardless of sex, color, creed, and ethnic background to an education. The government should address more fully the problems facing international students as well as cultural and linguistic minorities.

The National Week of Information is part of an on going campaign to make students and public aware of student concerns. It is particularly timely this year, coming one week before a major conference on post-secondary education, hosted by the Council of Ministers of Education of Canada, (CMEC) Oct. 19-22. Students of P.F.I. should have their unique concerns addressed and become aware of what is happening across Canada. Please take this opportunity to become involved and voice their questions.
