

Thinks Shot Of Helium And Oxygen Would Speed Brain

PEARL HARBOR. (AP)—Retiring Rear Admiral Charles B. Momsen says the human brain can function faster, better and more efficiently.

Momsen, who invented the Momsen lung, hopes to put his theory into practice when he retires from the navy about Sept. 1.

Momsen heads Joint Atomic Task Force 7 with advance headquarters at Pearl Harbor. His lifetime work with navy divers and submarines produced the submariner's escape device which bears his name.

DIVERS BENEFIT

His latest theory was born of these labors.

"Deep sea divers work longer hours and produce better work while breathing a mixture of helium and oxygen," he told a reporter in a recent interview.

"Why not doctors, office workers, government officials or students?"

"This helium-oxygen mixture could be piped into hospital opera-

ting rooms, schools, offices, warships—wherever acute mental processes would be advantageous," he said.

"Some day you may be sitting in a cool, comfortable office, breathing clean, invigorating gas mixtures and enjoying life in a new way. Or working 12 hours a day without fatigue, or doing six hours' work in four," Momsen said.

WOULD DEVELOP THEORY

He said he wants to work on his theory when he enters civilian life but so far has made no commitments on research or financing.

"Preliminary research and development will be expensive," Momsen said, "but the returns should be substantial.

"Improvement in brain function might be marginal but any improvement in a brain that's paid \$50,000 a year should be worthwhile," he said.

"The Momsen lung revolutionized submarine escape devices. It purifies stale air and permits a man escaping from a sunken sub to

breathes the same air over and over again until he reaches the surface.

Let's Talk It Over

We don't know whether or not the purchase of a bicycle license in Summerside entitles the buyer to drive his bicycle along the sidewalk, but apparently some of the small fry seem to think so. We don't suppose this is going on with the approval of the police; more likely the youngsters haven't been caught at the practice, or are defying law and order. We should imagine seeing bicycles on the sidewalks is rather a unique experience for our tourists, and might give the impression our policing of traffic is a bit lax.

As far as we know, no pedestrian has been bowled over by a cyclist. The point is, if one boy can ride his bicycle up on the sidewalk with the pedestrians, all the boys can. If many took advantage of this privilege, pedestrians would certainly have to keep their eyes open to stay off the casualty list. Now that there is parallel parking on both sides of Water Street, with a consequent lessening of traffic congestion, it seems right and proper that cyclists remain on the street with other vehicular traffic.

Piusville Man Drowned In Lake Near Halifax

Martin Gallant, 21-year old son of Mrs. Lauretta Gallant of Piusville, was drowned Sunday while swimming in a lake about 27 miles from Halifax.

Mr. Gallant, who had been living in Halifax for the past three years, went swimming after supper and apparently went beyond his depth. He was dragged from the lake by a bystander but efforts to revive him failed.

Besides his mother he is survived by a stepfather, Mr. Jack Gallant, and the following five brothers and two sisters: Alyre,

never driven such a truck previous to August 8th. He lived with his parents in a trailer camp at Sherwood. Was given a verbal message by unidentified man at 10.30 p.m. to fill the tanks on his truck and water the unfinished highway near Cornwall. He was accompanied by his sister. He saw the Maine car coming and strike the gravel pile and then struck his own car.

Bernard said he was going 25 or 30 miles per hour on his own side of the road. There was no gravel pile on his side of the road, witness said. He dimmed his lights as he approached the other car. Hearing his sister call, witness turned off his engine and got out flashlight. Bernard said he had been driving cars since 1949 but had no driver's license. He was actually working for Roy Gallant, who was employed by the Warren Paving Company.

William Walter Brehaut, garage mechanic gave evidence as to having examined both accident vehicles which he believed to have been in good mechanical condition prior to the accident.

On concluding the hearing of evidence, Coroner Prowse adjourned the enquiry until 7 p.m. on August 22 when evidence will be taken regarding the deaths of the other victims of the accident: Margaret Murray, Walter Murray, and Betty Bernard.

The jurors are: Frank J. Hansen, Robert J. Constable, Bryan Cudmore, Robert Younker, John K. Macdonald, Arthur H. Duvar and Hiram Atkinson.
