RECIPROCITY.

The one happy bit of the Liberal Government of Canada has been the giving of a tariff preference to British goods in the Canadian market.

But, after much costly blundering, they have at length afforded differential duties for British goods. This action of their's has won the favour of the British Government and people.

"The result of this will be that instead of our goods supplanting and replacing English goods in the Canadian market. English goods will supplant and replace our goods to the distinct disadvantage of all of our manufacturing industries.

The differential and protective duties of Canada will, it thus appears, give the Canadian Commissioners at Quebec an advantage which they ought to—and which we hope they will—make good.

entire freedom of trade, and hence dutiable goods coming from England to Canada are now taxed 12 1/2 per cent. less than similar goods coming from the United States.

The situation is thus considerably more favorable to Canada than it has been in any previous negotiation for reciprocity.

LOED HERSCHELL COMING.

LIVERPOOL, July 22.—The White Star line steamer Teutonic, which sailed for New York yesterday, takes among her passengers Baron Herschell, one of the High Commissioners of Great Britain to adjust the differences between the United States and Canada.

NEW YORK, July 21.—The reported death of General Garcia the Cuban leader, is not true. A cablegram was received from Santiago this morning, in which Garcia was mentioned as being not only alive, but very active.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 21.—General Shafter's army in Cuba will not for the present receive any pay from the United States Government.

The paymaster's department of the army had made definite arrangements to pay the United States army in Cuba some time next week.

The money intended for the troops at Santiago has been temporarily deposited in the Sub-Treasury at New York. The troops will not be paid for at least a month.
