Presbyterian General Assembly—TORONTO: Before adjourning the 80th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, meeting in St. Andrew's Church accepted a Budget of \$1,100,000 for 1955. The assembly also adopted a statement on the relation of Church and Nation, designated the Maritimes as the place where a Presbyterian Rally would be held in the Fall of 1955 and appointed a number of Maritimes to Boards and Committees of the Church.

A letter was read to the Assembly from the president of the National Presbyterian Young People's Societies expressing their gratitude for participation in the Pre-Assembly Congress. It was agreed that a similar Congress should be held every fourth year and that in the intervening years Regional Rallies should be held, the first in the Maritimes in 1956.

The Committee on Church and Nation submitted a statement on this subject on which it has been working since 1948. The statement in the Westminster Confession in this matter was specifically excluded in the Basis of Union when the Presbyterian Bodies in the Dominion came together in 1875. The Assembly accepted the statement slightly amended with only one dissenting voice, ordered it printed and distributed and sent down to the Presbyteries for their consideration and approval under the Barrier Act.

INTERESTING PROGRAM CARRIED OUT

Fish, Game Day At Ellerslie

—Mr. Erskine McNutt of Charlottetown was elected president of the Prince Edward Island Fish and Game Association at their annual meeting yesterday at Ellerslie, in which fly casting, skeet shooting and spinner tackle casting competitions, along with a demonstration of trout hooking equipment, highlighted an enjoyable afternoon.

A fairly large representation of association members and interested sportsmen from all three counties witnessed or showed their skill at fly-casting, with honors going to E. I. Rayner of Summerside, spinner tackle casting which was won by Benny Grady of Summerside and skeet shooting with Tam Gillies of Charlottetown scoring a perfect round blasting all twelve blackbirds.

Much interest was shown in the trout hooking equipment which is used by the trout investigation section of the Fisheries Research Board in catching trout for tagging, weighing and measuring before returning them to the stream.

Mr. Claude Hayes, who is in charge of trout investigation, which will ultimately ascertain the trout population of the Bideford River, assisted by the creel census taker Mr. Harold Ross put on the demonstration in which "the shock-

er," an electric shovel-type instrument, is used to set up a magnetic field which lures all fish within a range of several feet.

About six o'clock the Bideford Women's Institute catered to the gathering and served a chicken supper, after which the annual Prince Edward Island Fish and Game Association meeting was held, presided over by Tam Gillies retiring president R. H. Pound, who was out of the province in the interest of the association. A-

ter the various reports and the financial statement were read by secretary-treasurer, H. R. Vessey of Charlottetown, Mr. Norman MacLeod, secretary-treasurer of the Prince County branch and who was in charge of the afternoon program, presented appropriate prizes to the competition winners.

The election of officers for 1954-55 followed which saw Mr. McNutt elected president and Mr. R. H. Vessey re-elected to the office of secretary-treasurer.—S.
