## CANCER PARASITE.

EVIDENCE THAT IT INFECTS HOUSES, KILLING MANY OCCUPANTS.

The Symptoms of the Disease—Great Discoveries in its Treatment Expected by the Doctor—Proof That It is Contagious.

Cancer is a subject which is receiving a large share of attention from the medical profession just now. It is promised that we are on the eve of great discoveries, both as to the nature and the treatment of this terrible disease.

Enthusiastic surgeons, adopting the recently-developed parasite theory, are bringing forward cases which they claim prove it. One such was the death a few weeks ago of Dr. Edward W. Burnette of New York City. He operated on a patient for cancer and shortly afterwards cut his chest with a sharp and developed cancer in that place.

The thoroughness with which the question of inoculation has been investigated may be judged from the following statement in the last number of the Post Graduate of this city:

"Hahn in 1886 chloroformed a woman suffering from an inoperable cancer of the breast, cut out three fragments from the growth and transplanted them to the other breast. The woman died three months later from the cancer, and the histological examination showed that the nodules developed at the inoculated points and the same structure as the original tumor.

"Bergmann also confesses to having repeated Hahn's experiment, thus establishing the auto-inoculability of the disease.

Involved with the question of contagibility and inoculability is the new toxin or serum treatment. A solution obtained from the microbes of erysipelas is injected into malignant tumors. Up to the present better results have been obtained by this treatment than by any other method of removing the tumor, than in cancer.

At the same time the results from the treatment of cancer by the knife have been steadily improving, chiefly owing to the present method of removing all the involved area and its contiguous chains of glands. According to the writings of Drs. Weir, Dennis and Hahn in this country, a permanent cure is now obtained in every third or fourth case. The other two or three die after greatly varying periods. This is a wonderful advance on the conditions of five years ago.

In order that the public may appreciate the importance of these matters it will be well to explain in brief the theories of its origin, its symptoms, and so forth.

Cancer is the popular name for what is known scientifically as carcinoma. It is defined as a tumor composed chiefly of epithelial or skin cells, differing more or less in their type and arrangement from the normal epithelial cells, and having a tendency to unlimited growth. The cells grow into the surrounding connective tissue, which is thereby stimulated to increased development.

An extraordinary fact about cancer to the lay mind is that no tissue is found in the composition of the tumor which is not normally found in some other portion of the body. In the beginning it is merely misplaced tissue.

The names cancer and carcinoma are respectively derived from the Latin and Greek words for a crab. These names are given on account of the crab like appearance of the network of swollen veins which are needed to supply blood to the cancerous growth.

Cancer most frequently occurs at points where there is the greatest physiological activity, as in the breast in women, in the stomach, in the lungs, in the prostate gland, in the skin, and in the rectum.

Cancer of the lower lip is more frequent in men than in women. It usually breaks out at the junction of the red and the white skin. The great majority of sufferers are smokers.

It is certain that cancer is hereditary in certain families, but it is probably a disposition to contract the disease rather than the disease itself which is inherited.

Moles having hairs on them have frequently become the seat of cancer. If a hairy mole causes pain it should certainly be removed.

Surgeons advise the removal of all tumors, even if not malignant, because they may become so. Non-malignant growths sometimes become malignant after middle life.

The great remedy for cancer is early extirpation. In cases of removal within the first six months of the appearance of the disease there is 85 per cent. of cases of recovery where the region is an operative one. The longer the operation is delayed the less the chance of recovery. There have, however, been cases of a permanent cure after four years of cancer have been removed from the same place. Where the cancer appears at several places the chances of recovery are less.

The symptoms of cancer, if not situated on a part exposed to view, may exist for some time, even a year or more without attracting the attention of the sufferer.

If the cancer forms in the skin, an observant person will first notice a little pimple which does not disappear and of which the crust is continually renewed. It itches and provokes the patient to irritate it.

He will then notice that it is beginning to increase in size. It is usually slightly elevated, and the removal of the crust reveals an ulcerated or eroded, readily bleeding, slightly excavated surface. It possesses a hardness disproportionate to its size.

When it attains a considerable size a sharp shooting pain is felt. Pain is one of the characteristics of a malignant tumor which distinguishes it from a non-malignant.

This state of affairs may remain unchanged for many years to finally undergo either progressive or retrogressive changes. In the latter case the cancer cells may be destroyed by gradual degeneration or be so hemmed in as to be unable to develop further. These favorable changes are rare.

Irritation by clothing or handling increases the destruction of the tissues surrounding the growth and prevents favorable changes. These are

## ART AND LITERATURE IN CANADA.

There are cynics who say that there is no public opinion in Canada, no literature. At a dinner given recently by the publishers of Toronto to Mr. Hall Caine, the great novelist, this question was discussed, and a leading publisher remarked that literature would never make rapid advance in this country because it is difficult to induce Canadians to read the works of a Canadian author. This statement, however, is not true with regard to Toronto Saturday Night, which has as large a circulation as any newspaper of its class in America. Its Christmas Number, which will be issued Dec. 1, is the eighth in a series of art numbers. It will be accompanied this year by five splendid colored supplements; the largest, a reproduction of a painting by a Canadian artist, done by the artist for Saturday Night, is 23 x 33 inches in size. Its title is "Champlain the Explorer," and depicts him and a flotilla of war canoes entering the mouth of a river on Lake Huron.
