Geese brought from 50 to 60 cents each, and turkeys from 70 to \$1.00 each. Hay was in small supply at 50 to 60 cents per 100 lbs. Oats still held at 33 to 34 cents per bushel. Turnips 12 to 14 cents per bushel.

THE BRITANNIA--A Halifax despatch says: The tug Underwriter with lighters has succeeded in floating the steamer Britannia off, into and up the passage leading through between the island and the mainland. The steamer will be grounded at some suitable place near Harrington, and divers will be employed to make temporary repairs to the bottom, to get her safely removed to a dry dock. The object struck by the Britannia has been ascertained to have been the wreck of the steamer Salina, which lies two and a half miles southeast of Cape Sable.

BUCK TO BE HANGED

On December First. MONCTON, Nov. 1. Buck is to be hanged on Thursday, 1st of December, at Dorchester. Radcliffe, the Toronto public hangman, expects to have the job. It is understood the execution will take place in the interior of the jail as there is no ground attached to the prison where any privacy could be obtained. The condemned man has lost his buoyancy of spirit and approaches death in a rather sultry mood and the apparent indifference hitherto shown is now passing away.

GODFREY KNOCKED OUT

In the Fifteenth Round. NEW YORK, Nov. 1. The fight between Choyinski and George Godfrey last night attracted a large crowd. Both men entered the ring looking in splendid condition. Up to the end of the fourth round there was some hard fighting, but neither seemed to have any advantage. From the fourth to the end of the twelfth round Choyinski got in some good work, but Godfrey responded in the eighth. The men were even up to the ninth round. Considerable sparring was indulged in up to the 12th round, when Godfrey got in two stinging blows on Choyinski, knocking him down. The Californian was soon on his feet again and began to punish the Bostonian, whom he knocked out in the fifteenth round. Choyinski will probably challenge the winner of the Goddard-Maher fight, which takes place early in December.

Gigantic Financial Sensation.

LONDON, Nov. 1. The collapse of the Liberator Building Society simultaneously with the downfall of the London and General Bank will likely prove one of the most gigantic financial sensations of the generation. Figures presented at the meeting of shareholders and creditors of the Liberator Society by the official receiver show the society owed shareholders and creditors £3,313,000, with a reserve fund of only £90,000, and little more than a mere book entry at that. The mortgages amounted to £1,423,000. An investigation will probably prove them valueless. As £3,188,286 are lent to three companies now in liquidation, there are virtually no free assets, and only £50,000 in sight to meet a deficit of £36,000.
