Service Vote Was 257.7 Lib.

OTTAWA CP — Just suppose that only the armed forces vote decided the 1957 federal general election. The result would be a Liberal avalanche, instead of the Progressive Conservative victory on the service-plus-civilian count.

A compilation of the service vote released Saturday by chief electoral officer Nelson Gaston, showed Liberals swept all except seven of the 254 seats contested.

Against the 257 Liberal majorities in the service vote, the Progressive Conservatives had four; Social Credit two and the CCF one.

Leaders of the three major parties opposed to the Liberals—John Diefenbaker of the Conservatives, M. J. Coldwell of the CCF and Solon Low of Social Credit—all trailed their Liberal opponents in the service tabulation.

The only non-Liberals who won the service vote in their constituencies, with their winning margins: Donald Fleming PC - Toronto Eglinton 28; C. W. Hodgson PC - Victoria, Ont. 19; Davie Fulton PC - Kamloops, B.C. 14; Howard Green PC - Vancouver Quads 4; Victor Quetch SC - Acadia, Alta. 2; John Blackmore SC - Lethbridge, Alta. 18; A. M. Nicholson CCF - Mackenzie, Sask. 14. In all cases, the runner-up was a Liberal.

Of a total of 74,743 ballots were cast in the service vote - 48,145 for the Liberals, 18,101 for the Conservatives, 3,385 for the CCF, 3,008 for Social Credit. Remainder of the votes went to others and there were 1,192 rejected ballots.

The Liberal party was the only one known to have circularized the eligible service voters. During the campaign, Mr. Diefenbaker questioned the propriety of this move, a letter over the signature of Prime Minister St. Laurent. Mr. Castonguay said lists of service electors and their addresses were available to all parties.

In Prince Albert, Sask., Mr. Diefenbaker got 84 service votes compared with his Liberal opponent's 129. In Roseauville - Biggar, Sask., Mr. Coldwell trailed a Liberal 64 to 41. In Peace River, Alta., Low had 78 against 82 for the Liberal there.

On the other hand, in Quebec East - Mr. St. Laurent received 309 service votes compared with 17 and three for his Conservative and Social Credit opponents, respectively.

Nine Liberal cabinet ministers were defeated on the combined service-plus-civilian vote. But all got the most service votes in their constituencies.

Loss Of People Is Serious Political Science Assn Told

OTTAWA (CP) — Professor Anthony D. Scott of Vancouver says more provincial governments ought to conduct actions of oil and gas lands, and timber rights, rather than negotiate with single firms.

"As an economist," the University of British Columbia professor said, "I am impressed by the virtues of competition in these situations."

"It may be impossible," he told the Canadian Political Science Association Saturday. "For administrators of provincial resources to obtain any idea of the value of a new discovery by negotiation with a single firm."

"Royalties may be ridiculously high or low. Only the obtaining of bids from competing firms will permit the province to find the best exploiter and to get the best return of proceeds."

EMIGRATION A PROBLEM
The association was meeting at the University of Ottawa in conjunction with the Congress of Learned Societies, a fortnight-long seminar of the country's intellectuals which ends Monday.

Professor Gordon A. Goundrey of Memorial University, St. John's, Nfld., told the political scientists that emigration—the loss of people—"is a serious problem" to the losing country.

Each emigrant represented a cost in social services, education and training.

"Immigration is the cheapest way of acquiring increased resource capital — and far cheaper than home-grown babies," he said. "As a minimum policy, provinces should strive to maintain their so-called capital-trained manpower intact. 'No province can be expected to accept as a last resort the migration or transfer of its people,'" he said in an oblique reference to a Gordon economic royal commission recommendation that if efforts at economic stimulation failed the transfer of some Mar-

May Adopt Practice Of Permanent Speaker

OTTAWA (CP) — The Commons may see inauguration of a new practice — a permanent Speaker who would not be changed from one Parliament to the next.

Conservative leader John Diefenbaker has proposed adoption of such a practice, similar to the tradition in the British House of Commons.

However, with the Conservatives in an outright Commons majority and with another election likely within a year, it is possible Mr. Diefenbaker would delay implementing the change until he sees whether a new vote would give him a clear majority.

The Canadian tradition has been to choose a new Speaker at the start of each Parliament, alternating between French-speaking and English-speaking MPs. The nomination is made by the government side of the Commons from within its membership, and customarily is accepted by all parties.

PROPOSAL DURING DEBATE
During last year's pipeline debate, when an unsuccessful centre motion was made against Speaker Rene Beaudoin, both Mr. Diefenbaker and CCF leader Coldwell proposed adoption of the British system of a permanent Speaker.

In the recent election campaign the Conservative leader, speaking May 15 at Carman, Man., said the change was needed to remove the Speaker's office from "partisan politics."

"I believe that to preserve Parliament, both races would agree to putting the Speaker above party politics."

If such a practice were launched there is no assurance it would be continued following any future change of government, barring a general agreement to do so.

But if the Conservatives decide to go ahead, speculation is that they might offer the permanent speakership to CCF member Stanley Knowles, whose detailed knowledge of the intricate Commons rules is generally acknowledged in all parties. He might decline; he is party whip, CCF national vice-chairman and one of the party's most effective MPs in debate.

SPEAKER NOT OPOSED
In the British tradition, the Speaker is unopposed in his own constituency at election time. His rulings are subject to appeal, say the situation, but he is not immune to a vote of censure or removal by the Commons, although with the emphasis on ability when a Speaker is chosen that is unlikely.

In Canada the Speaker receives, besides \$10,000 a year as MP, a salary of \$9,000 and automobile and residence allowances totalling \$4,000—a total of \$23,000 a year. If a Conservative government decides to choose a Speaker from within its ranks at the expected fall session of Parliament, that would diminish by both amount and power in the House, which already is a minority. The Speaker may vote only to break a Commons tie, and tradition is that he should vote in such a way as not to defeat the government. But experts say this situation has never arisen in Parliament here.

TWO TORY EXPERTS
The Conservatives have two recognized experts on parliamentary rules and procedure who could be named Speaker—David Fulton and Michael J. O'Brien. Both are virtually certain to enter a Conservative cabinet.

Other possible candidates within the party for the Speaker's throne include Gordon Churchill of Winnipeg South Centre and D. R. Dickson of Toronto. Both are cabinet members.

There are other Conservatives with experience in the Commons and perhaps some newly-elected members with adequate experience in provincial legislatures, who might be called on to fill the post.

Ex-Rodeo Rider Is Pack- Horse King Of The North West

FORT ST. JOHN, B.C. (CP)—Known as the "pack-horse king" of the north, Thomas (Tommy) Wilde has been hauling supplies for oil men, explorers and other travellers of Canada's northwest for 30 years. But he says his biggest business may come this year.

Wilde has been dickering with the Atomic Energy Commission to supply an advance guard of engineers and geologists working along the Finlay river between Meleod Lake and Ware. This is part of the Rocky Mountain trench development envisioned in British Columbia.

With a 2,000-acre ranch 40 miles north of here, Wilde has 150 pack horses, and he said the Finlay River stretch would require about 100 of them. "It will be the biggest thing since the Canol pipeline project," he said of his prospects of riding with the Wenner-Gren project.

WARTIME PROJECT
A stocky man of about 50, who started out as a rodeo rider on the American circuits, Wilde calls the Canol project of 1943 his top adventure in this rugged region far northwest of the coast. The Canol wartime project included construction of a 606-mile pipeline from an oil field at Fort Norman, N.W.T., to a refinery at Whitehorse in the Yukon.

Under Wilde's direction, 30 packers with 120 horses moved out of Fort Norman and Whitehorse in the spring of 1943 to accompany survey parties blazing the sub-Arctic route for the four-inch pipe and selecting sites for pumping stations.

Along the way the packers had to face such problems as organizing airdrops of feed for the horses, building rafts to cross Arctoc rivers and laying out coroduro roads over the muskeg.

With completion of the survey in the winter of 1944 Wilde and his men returned to their bases, but he first pack trains to complete the far-north trip.

The booming Western Canada oil industry has provided most of Wilde's work in recent years. With a 20-hour course in 1953, he blazed a trail for the first leg of export pipeline to the west coast. In the winter of 1955-56, he took a "brushing" contract, leading a 200-man crew building a 60-foot right-of-way along the same trail.

ABORTIVE EXPEDITION
Wilde says his most unusual adventure came in 1934 when he signed a contract with a French millionaire, Charles E. Budeau, to blaze a trail from Fort St. John to the Musqua River, 200 miles to the northwest.

"Budeau said the idea was to find the shortest route from Edmonton to the northwest coast of the Yukon," Wilde said. The Frenchman's objective was to reach Telegraph Creek, in the northwestern corner of British Columbia.

Wilde said five Citroen cars equipped with half a truck were designed for Sahara Desert travel. But they were no match for the northland's bush and muskeg. The expedition finally bogged down 350 miles northwest of Fort St. John and never reached its destination.

Heads Rhodes Scholars Ass'n
OTTAWA (CP) — Dr. J. F. Leddy of Saskatoon, dean of arts and science at the University of Saskatchewan, was elected president of the Canadian Association of Rhodes Scholars during the weekend.

He and other members of the new slate hold office until 1959, when the next reunion is scheduled. The meeting was held at the University of Ottawa campus, where the conference of learned societies under way since June 3 ends today.

Other officers: Vice president Dr. F. G. Kergin, physician, Toronto and Dr. Roger Gaudy, research chemist, Montreal.
