Frank F. Hull of Toronto, chairman of the national executive committee of the Canadian Red Cross Society, will be the guest speaker at the annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Red Cross to be held Thursday, Feb. 21 with sessions at 8 and 6:15 p.m.

Mr. Hull will be the assistant general manager of the Toronto division of the Toronto-Dominion Bank, has been an enthusiastic Red Cross volunteer for many years and held many important positions in branches and in the Ontario division prior to his election as an officer of the central office.

In this, the centenary year of the founding of the International Red Cross, Mr. Hull will speak at the dinner meeting, will take as his subject, "Red Cross - Past and Present", and dwell particularly on the part played by Red Cross in the development of Canada's health program over the years.

Ferment in Quebec  
Is Described Normal

MONTREAL (CP) — Premier Jean Lesage said Saturday night the ferment in Quebec today represents nothing more than a return to normal. He said some people have been misled by the rapid changes in Quebec's economic, social and educational life as a temporary disturbance caused by unstable elements of the people.

Others took upon them as a brutal and permanent overturning of the traditional way of life. "What I mean is that the people of Quebec have given themselves, in the space of a few months, social and economic institutions from which they could have benefited years ago," he said.

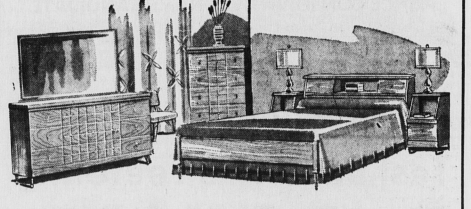

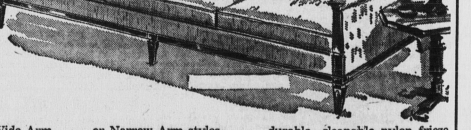
