

Pete Kelly Wins Maritime Golf Ch'ship

Anchors Down Falcons 6-4 To Cop Top Spot In Local Baseball League

The steamrolling West-end Anchors moved into sole possession of first place in the City Baseball League yesterday evening as they whipped Buck Whitlock's Falcons 6-4 for their fourth straight win. The game was called at the end of five and a half innings.

Anchors survived a stormy first inning, when the Falcons scored four runs, to come back and win the ball game. The west-end crew scored one run in the first inning and five in the second. Five of their runs were unearned.

The defeat dropped the Falcons into third place in the league standings. Rovers are in second place a half game behind the Anchors.

Left-hander Jackie Burke went the distance for the Anchors giving up four hits and striking out eight. Burke had a tough time in the first inning when he surrendered three hits and four runs. He settled down in the second inning and remained in control of matters for the rest of the game. He struck out three men in the last inning.

Young Earl MacKinnon started on the mound for the Falcons, giving up four runs on one hit and the game in the second inning. Four walks, Cliff Ready entered with none out and two on base. Ready was touched for three hits in four innings and struck out one. He gave up two runs, the Anchors margin of victory.

Joe LeClair hit a double and Shepherd and Joe Coyle smashed out singles in the Falcons four run first inning. Burke gave up a walk and an Anchor error permitted two runs to score.

Anchors came up with one run in their half of the first. Merlin MacKenzie singled to right field went to third on two passed balls and scored on an infield out.

Four unearned runs in the second inning gave the Anchors the ball game. Five runs were scored on two walks, two hit batters, two errors and Willis Hennessy's single.

That ended the scoring for the

night. Falcons threatened to get back in the game in the fifth inning but the threat was wiped out when Shepherd was caught trying to steal third base. Hennessy and Pineau combined on a nice play to nab the speedy Shepherd who had already stolen two bases.

Longest hits of the game were doubles by Joey LeClair of the Falcons and young Duck MacLeod of the Anchors. Kenny MacDonald, left fielder of the Falcons came through with his first base hit of the season. Fielding gem was Spy Ready's over the shoulder catch of Merlin MacKenzie's high fly in the fourth inning.

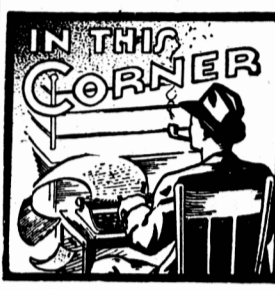
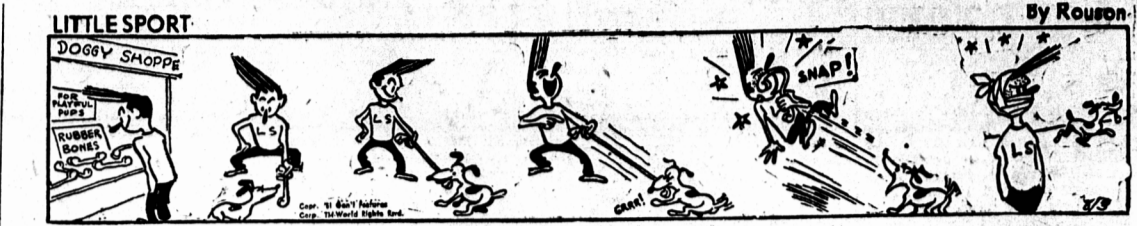

Top prize of the week went to Major A. F. Gormley when he won the Governor General's Silver Medal for the highest score in the Grand Aggregate yesterday as the 79th Annual Provincial Rifle Association Prize Meet came to a close.

At the close of the final day's shooting the riflemen were guests of the Department of Physical Fitness at a dinner at the Keppoch Beach Hotel where the prizes were presented to the various winners of matches by Premier J. Walter Jones.

Several matches were 'tied' during the day with Bdr. Ray MacDonald, 28th L.A.A. Regiment, being the winner of the Nicholson Tyro Aggregate with a top score of 448. Runner-up was P.O. A. W. Loverock, R.C.N. (R), with 436. The MacKinnon Match was won by Cpl. W. M. Beatty, R.C.M.P., in a four-way shoot-off. He won the Field Ambulance Trophy.

The Consolation Trophy was won by Capt. James Coles, P. E. I. R., with a score of 46. Runner-up was Cpl. A. Rodd with 45.

Major A. F. Gormley captured the United Services Officers' Club Match while in second place was Cpl. Alton Rodd with Sgt. Eric Coles third.

Joe Louis Disappointed Despite Win

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 2—(AP)—Old Joe Louis, decisive winner over Cesar Brion of the Argentine in a furious 10-round battle last night, expressed keen disappointment today over circumstances which may keep him from a title fight for possibly a year.

The former champion, informed of the agreement between titleholder Joe Walcott and Ezzaro Chavez to postpone their championship rematch until next year, said he had not given up hope of regaining the crown.

"As long as Walcott or Chavez has got it, we still have hope," he said.

Louis and Marshall Miles, his manager, will confer with Jim Norris, president of the International Boxing Club in New York tomorrow.

A crowd of approximately 12,000 paid \$66,525 to see Louis battle the game South American all over the ring in the closing rounds.

Brion stood up under punishment that would have flattened many a fighter. He was groggy from the seventh through the tenth. His face was puffed and blood flowed from cuts on the side of each eye.

It was Louis' second 10-round win over Brion. This one was far more decisive than their melee in Chicago last November.

Dramatic Battle With Mousie Dowling Caps Tournament Here

Pete Kelly of Fredericton, N. B., yesterday won the Maritime Amateur Golf Championship, defeating Maurice (Mousie) Dowling of Moncton, N. B., the defending champion, one-up in an extra hole of the 36-hole competition.

It was a terrific struggle that was waged over the Belvedere links of the Charlottetown Golf Club. Three holes down as a result of a shaky start in the morning round, Dowling roared back with a final blast of three birdies on the 34th, 35th and 36th holes to even the match.

On the 37th hole which is the 363 yard No. 1, both players reached the green in two—Kelly about 10 feet from the pin and Dowling about four. Kelly holed out in a beautiful putt for a birdie three. Dowling's putt saw the pellet rim the cup to lose a brilliantly played match.

Both players performed as if there were ice water in their veins. They were cool and calculating and gave the large gallery an exhibition of golf seldom seen in these parts. For the sorely-tempted athletic director of the University of New Brunswick it was no new role assuming a Maritime title. He first won the championship here in 1937, and five years later repeated at Saint John, N. B.

On the opening 18 holes played in the morning the finalists were tied on the outgoing nine. The score of steadiness, Kelly pulled ahead on the 10th, 11th and 13th and maintained this lead going into the afternoon round.

On the outgoing nine of the second round, play sea-sawed as first then one then the other registered a hole. On the 24th Dowling had whittled Kelly's lead to one. They halved the 25th, but Kelly recovered to win the next two holes and regain his original lead. They halved the 28th but Dowling again cut the lead to two on the 29th.

They halved the 30th, but Kelly once more made it three-up on the 31st. The next two holes were halved. Seemingly to sense defeat Dowling threw caution to the winds and rallied to fire a succession of three birdies that deadlocked the match and set the stage for the dramatic extra hole to finish.

In the final 19 holes of the feature match, Kelly had 12 pars and three birdies, while Dowling shot 10 pars and four birdies.

The offer was made to him aboard the Trans-Atlantic liner Liberte taking him home from Europe after losing his world middleweight title to Randolph Turpin of Britain. A contract is expected to be signed this month.

The play deals with racialism, personified in the two main roles—those of a white woman and her Negro friend, to be played by Robinson.

Miss Daintry Chisholm of Royal Montreal, a niece of Mrs. Darling, and present Quebec ladies' champion, fired a 79 and was runner-up after the first 18 holes of the 54-hole championship.
