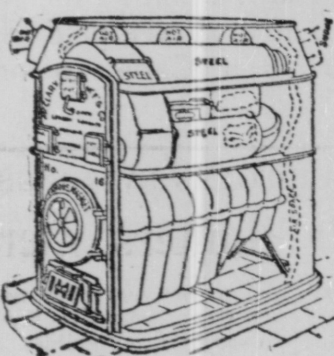

FARMERS MEETING AT GUELPH

JUDGING THE CARCASSES.

Right Kind of Bacon Hog.

BIG FARMING IN ONTARIO.

[Special correspondence of THE EXAMINER.]

THURSDAY, Dec. 13.—The leading feature of the Exhibition to-day was the judging of the carcasses of the cattle and hogs. The sheep carcasses will be judged tomorrow.

The carcasses are judged in the cooling room, and the prizes awarded to the best from a consumer's standpoint. A selection is then made which includes the first prize or sweepstakes animal and the poorest and most unsuitable and some that are intermediate. These are run into the lecture room, where they hang in front of the audience, while expert judges point out their good qualities and defects.

The first prize beef carcass was condemned by the butchers as being altogether too fat for Canadian trade. Two of the principal meat dealers in Western Ontario who were lecturing on the carcasses said they would give as much for the thin carcass per pound as the fat one simply because their customers wanted that kind of meat. J. A. Leaman, of Halifax, bought one of the five steers and sent men all the way

up from Halifax to dress it so as to have it in the best condition for his Christmas trade. To-night we had a very interesting meeting addressed by two of the principal pork packers of Ontario. There were half-a-dozen carcasses hanging in the lecture room, which ranged from perfection down to the most objectionable type of bacon hog. The first prize carcass was the result of a cross between a pure Tamworth boar and a high grade Yorkshire sow. The second best was a pure Yorkshire, and the worst—an altogether unsuitable animal for bacon—was a Poland China.

A great amount of valuable information was elicited from the packers as to the exact kind of a carcass they must have in order to put up Wiltshire brand, the highest brand of Canadian bacon. The bacon hogs shown here show a very small development of fat, not more than an inch in thickness on the breast.

We have here gathered great numbers of the very best producers of cattle, sheep and swine on the continent, and one gets the impression in meeting with them from day to day and hearing them discuss stock matters, that Ontario is a great and progressive stock country that already has made a great success along all agricultural lines, but one is also further impressed with the fact these same people who have accomplished so much already are still going ahead till they will hardly be second to the Old country as a centre of live stock breeding.

There has been a very large attendance at the show and it will be a financial success.

The meeting in the Town Hall last night was one of the largest I ever attended. The speakers were President Mills, of the O. A. C., Hon. John Dryden, Sydney Fisher, Minister of Agriculture, and Hon. Mr. Farris, F. L. Haszard and E. B. Elderkin, who spoke for their respective provinces.

A hearty welcome was tendered the visitors to the city by Mayor Nelson.

Guelph is a beautiful city, streets very wide and planted with trees. The buildings are not high as in larger cities, nor are they close together, giving the city a little of the appearance of a country town. The public buildings, such as the Town Hall, churches and high schools, are fine structures, built as all the best of the city is, of stone.
