DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

THE REDISTRIBUTION BILL

SOME AMENDMENTS DISPOSED OF

Cartwright Dressed Down.

OTTAWA, June 29. In the House yesterday, after several verbal amendments had been made to the redistribution bill, a clause was added providing that the act shall only take effect upon the dissolution of the present Parliament.

Mills suggested that some provision should be made in the bill for securing the opinion of the Supreme Court upon the constitutionality of the bill; but Sir John Thompson refused to accept the proposal, declaring that it was unnecessary, as a case could be submitted to the Supreme Court at any time without any special legislation.

Upon motion for the third reading of the bill, Cartwright moved his amendment for the uniting of the ridings of South Grenville and North Leeds and Grenville, and of Lanark and Frontenac.

The House divided upon Cartwright's amendment, which was rejected by a vote of 99 to 57.

He moved an amendment in favor of leaving Prince Edward Island as at present divided, Prince and Queen's counties to retain two members each and King's one. This was rejected on a vote of 87 to 54.

Messrs. Weir, MacLean, (Govt) and Dickey voted with Opposition.

After a recess, Cartwright took the floor to discuss the Caron correspondence. He said the charges and proofs submitted to the House proved a long conspiracy against the State, to which at least part of the government were parties. The authenticity of the papers published by the Toronto Globe was not denied, and no other government in the country would permit such a matter to go uninvestigated.

Cartwright closed by declaring that he was ashamed of his province, and advised the Government to drop disguise, haul down the Canon Jack, and hoist the black flag at once.

Sir John Thompson in reply made one of the best speeches he has delivered in Parliament and was cheered to the echo. He said that Cartwright's speech contained the old stale invective which had caused the people of the country to listen to him with gusto and by which he had decimated the ranks of his followers.

The country had fittingly estimated this screaming scandal-monger who, while in office, gobbled the treasury for purposes of political advantage. (Applause.) Cartwright had been pleased to refer to him (Sir John Thompson) as having been a few years ago but a young and tottering politician.

But he could say that long before he had, by invitation, entered the field of Dominion politics he had learned of Cartwright as one of the most miserable totterers who ever crossed the political platform in Canada. (Applause.) He had to-night given one of those war, famine and pestilence speeches which had carried constituencies for the Conservative party wherever made. It was in a sense gratifying that he laid aside the mask to show that the political trainer had degenerated into the trucking corruptionist as well.

Sir Richard had been pleased to refer to him (Sir John) as a successful defender of dangerous criminals. No doubt he had been but he must decline this gentleman's brief. In his practice at the bar he had never shrunk from taking anyone's case, but he had sometimes spurned the fee of a blatant scoundrel who denounced everybody else in the world but was himself the worst savage of them all. (Loud cheers.)

Cartwright's supporters must, as he spoke, have a recollection of the fact that since last session he had reduced their ranks by 50 per cent, and this would be emphasized by the fact that he had chosen for his speech to-night, a time when they were forced to celebrate the loss of Politac, (applause), a constituency almost within sound of the proceedings of parliament, but which the courts had decided had been carried by the Liberals only through corrupt means. (Cheers from a party standpoint.)

So grateful did he feel to Cartwright that it were necessary to make an effort to retain that gentleman in the party which he desired to lead, and which would not have him as such. (Applause.) He would almost propose a subsidy to keep him there.

Sir John's address throughout was a scathing rejoinder to Cartwright's speech, and the applause was at times deafening.

Mr. Laurier spoke in defence of Cartwright, adjourning at 12.15.

The total amount of new subsidies to railways is slightly over a million and a half of dollars.

Another Big Victory.

TORONTO, June 29. The contest in Pontiac yesterday resulted in the election of Bryson (Conservative) by 700 of a majority.
